BDR. R. J. WRIGHT

Son of Mayor and Mrs. Wright, who returned home from overseas last Sunday. "Dick" as he is known to his many friends, enlisted with the 63rd Battery, Guelph, in April 1916, and went to England in September of the same year. He was sent to France in December with a draft for the 43rd Battery. He was through many battles, the 43rd particularly distinguishing themselves at Vimy Ridge, Passchendaele, Amiens, Arras and Cambrai followed. At Cambrai on the 1st of October, 1918 he received his serious wounds, consisting of five bad cuts in the abdomen, besides minor wounds in the leg and forearm, and for some weeks his life was despaired of. But he possessed an exceptionally strong constitution, and after a month in the hospital in France, was sent to England, where he has remained until sailing for home on a hospital ship. He landed in Portland, Maine, and arrived in London Sunday morning, where he was met by motor and brought home. After a short visit at his home here, he expects to return to London and undergo another operation, which it is hoped will greatly benefit his health. At the time Dick joined the 43rd Battery there were five Aylmer boys in it: Hugh Hill, Andrew Mott, Eric Bingham, Harry Wright and himself. Gunner Arthur Youell, who paid the supreme sacrifice was a member of the same brigade, and after he was struck by a shell, Bdr. Wright rode for some distance with him on a wagon which took him back.
