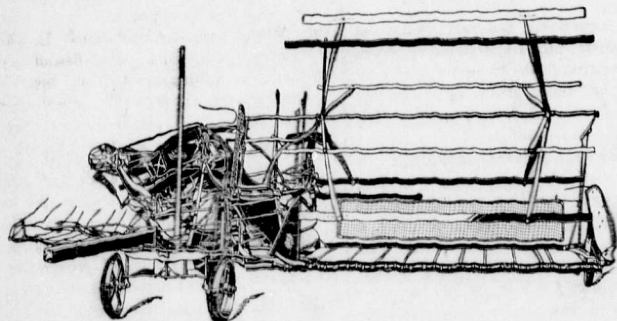

TO CLEAN PANAMA HATS.

A Panama hat can be successfully
scrubbed with tepid soapy water,
provided a pure white soap is used.
First brush the hat as free of dust as
possible and then scrub, using a soft
nail brush. Wipe it dry with a piece
of soft cloth, as you work.

Another way is to mix white corn-
meal with gasoline until it forms a
paste. Rub the straw with this, us-
ing a cloth. This is called a dry
scrub. Do this work away from all
fire and artificial light. The meal
will take out the dirt wonderfully.
Rub with a soft cloth and then when
the hat is cleaned, rub hard with a
fresh dry cloth.

Lemon juice is good, too. Dip a
cloth or soft brush in lemon juice
and scour the hat with it; then leave
it for six hours. Sponge off at the
end of that time with peroxide of
hydrogen, and expose the hat to the
hot sun for an hour or so.
