to be in the Canadian army, one of the
best of all nations.

name of Canadians and should not
have to be coaxed to come and give
us a hand to help win this great
war. As for myself, I have seen a lot
of my good friends left behind out
here but I am proud to know that
they were volunteers and have done

here since I came. Private Ellis
Walker and myself are the only ones
left of the Port Burwell boys that
have gone through it all and each
one of us has been hit and we are

best of luck and I wish to be remem-
