—It is reported that the Rev. Dr. Mock-

—According to the report of the in-

spector of weights and measures there are

3,748 avoirdupois weights in London, 684

being two-pound weights and 626 one-

pound weights. There is only one twenty-

pound weight and three ten-pound ones.

Of all these weights but one was rejected

during the year.

—My mother-in-law tells me, said Mr.

Gosington, "that the best thing to clean

—A novelty in the sleigh line is attract-

A Warning.

The postoffice department calls attention

to a practice prevailing in certain parts of

the country of printing upon the envelopes

of wrappers inclosing printed matter a re-

quest to have such matter returned to the

sender in the event of its not being deliv-

ered within a certain number of days. This

request is contrary to the regulations of the

postoffice department, printed matter

not being returnable to the sender. Such
