Narrow Tread

A new bicycle in town seldom excites exerted on them, causing an irregular wearing of the cups, cones and balls, which forces the sprocket to wobble and the wheel to run hard. The sample shown is a road wheel weighing 23 pounds, with 30-tooth front sprocket and 12-tooth rear, making 70 gear. Besides the crank hanger, the wheel has many fine points of construction, a most beautiful fork, com-pression clamps for seat post and handle bars, elegant finish, and a new cone locking device on the wheels, by which the adjustment is not disturbed when the wheels are removed from the

Railway Rumblings.

The Grand Trunk Leasing More Land in Detroit.

Belleville Fighting to Get C. P. R. Connection.

Railway people expect nearly 50,000 to attend the Endeavor convention at San Francisco on July 12. Sarnia Canadian: The removal of the Port Huron locomotive shops and roundhouse from Fort Gratiot to the tunnel is almost assured. It is stated that it costs \$20,000 a year of unnecessary expense to maintain the shops at so great a distance from the main line of the road. It is believed that work on the removal will be commenced as soon as the frost is out of the ground.

Detroit Free Press: "For many months past the Grand Trunk Railway Company has been negotiating for the lease of large tracts of land along the line of the Detroit, Grand Haven and Milwaukee Railway and in the vicinity brook road, will furnish ample space for the company's car shops, storage

tracks and switch yard." Belleville has been witnessing a lively fight on the question of renewing efforts to secure the C. P. R. connection. That railway runs within eighteen miles of the city, and naturally there has been considerable demand for a spur line into the city. The city has been lately urging the G. T. R. to grant improved facilities in various ways. Mayor Johnson has taken the ground that no rival railway should be encouraged to come to Belleville lest the city's interests be injured by antagonizing the G. T. R. At this week's council meeting the mayor con-demned Ald. Cameron Brown for bringing in a motion calling upon the executive to obtain all possible information on the C. P. R. question, and bitterly denounced the Sun newspaper for agitating the question. The council talked until midnight on the question, and finally adopted Ald. Brown's motion, only two aldermen voting nay. "The mayor repudiates the Sun, whereat the council repudiates the mayor," is the way the Sun's headlines an-nounce the result.
