

RATES ON BICYCLES.

Frauds on the Customs Render Change in the Regulations Necessary.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.-The regulations coverning the bicycles of tourists promulgated a few months ago have been used as a means of getting in travelers' samples of bicycles, and have been anceled. New regulations were yesterday issued by the customs depart-ment as follows:

"In all cases where bicycles not new by tourists are brought into Canada the importer shall report the same at the nearest custom house, and be entitled to delivery thereo upon depositing with the collector of ustoms an amount equal to the duty upon the retail price of each such bi-ycle, and upon signing a collector's permission, on the face of which shall be written a full description of the wheel, stating the maker's name, style of wheel, the number, whether man's, woman's or boy's, full name and ad-dress of tourist, amount of deposit made, and date within which and the port where the wheel will re re-exported, and upon due proof of exportaion of same within the time spec ied the amount deposited shall be re-



Toronto, Ont., Aug. 10 .- "Everyone should be vaccinated, or we may have trouble this summer," said Dr. Bryce, provincial secretary of the board o health, on his return from Montreal. Dr. Bryce's trip was partly with a view to ascertaining what responsibility rested on the Belleville authorities for the coming of the smallpox patient, Whitney, to Toronto, and what patient, Whitney, to Toronto, and what is usually indicated beforehand by the general possibilities of contagion prevalence of chickenpox. The unfortunate phase of the matter is that people will not get vaccinated until a scare takes place. The coming of smallp there is an outbreak of chickenpox, everybody in the community should b vaccinated, according to Dr. Bryce's opinion.
