CLOUDY; SNOW, TURNING TO RAIN

Toronto, Feb. 11—11 p.m.—The pressure is highest to the northward of the lake region, and there is an important storm developing in the lower Mississippi Valley. An easterly gale occurred in the Maritime Provinces Saturday night. Fine colder weather has prevailed to-day in Ontario and Quebec.

(4) That he has had a residence in the Province for the last twelve months.

—Mr. James Deveney, traveler for Wm. Ellis, is dangerously ill in St. Joseph's Hospital with typhoid fever.

—London Westers are talking of petitioning for an electric light at each end of the railway. Both are very much needed.

—Prof. Mark B. Beal, of the Albion College, Mich., will appear in an entertainment in the First Congregational Church on Thursday evening.

—Miss A. Stevely, of this city, was a guest at the Knox College Literary and Scientific Society's conversation at Toronto on Friday evening.

—"Subscriber," London township.—The record of London township for 1894 is Peter Elson, and the deputy reeves: First, R. Dreaney; second, J. R. Hodgins; third, J. H. Hodgins; and fourth, Edward Dann.

—Edward Cavanagh, who will be remembered as having been given three months in the Central Prison last fall for battering Esther Barnes' residence in East London, has been arrested charged with complicity in the stealing of Mr. Andrew McCormick's turkeys.

—The South London Temperance Dramatic Club is billed to give the "Social Glass, or Victims of the Bottle," on Tuesday, Feb. 13, in Somerset Hall, and in the English Church Sunday school room, London West, on Thursday, Feb. 22.

The drama is a strong plea for immediate action to establish prohibition and is strongly indorsed by ministers of the Gospel.

—At the annual meeting of the Ladies' Aid of Wellington Street Methodist Church the report of the treasurer showed a balance of \$101.10. Of this \$100 was handed over to the trustees of the church. The relief committee reported the helping of several needy homes with Christmas cheer, besides other aid given throughout the year.

A committee of twelve ladies was appointed to visit and welcome new or strange members of the congregation. In the choosing of officers all the former staff were re-elected.

—Wm. Barriar and wife, of Center street, London West, were before Squire R. F. Lucey on Saturday. On Friday night the two had a dispute and aroused the neighbors with their loud talk. John Storey, a neighbor, was giving an account of the disturbance, when Barriar jumped up and called him a liar. The magistrate warned Barriar to keep quiet. It had a beneficial effect for a while, but when Storey repeated another interesting part of the story, Barriar again jumped up and repeated the previous epithet, compounded with addition of a foul expression. The magistrate at once closed the proceedings, gave Barriar a word of advice, and committed him to jail for two days for contempt of court. This afternoon the charge of disorderly conduct will be heard.

Women's Missionary Work.
The London district convention of the Women's Missionary Society will be held in the Wellington Street Methodist Church this afternoon and evening. The afternoon session will be taken up chiefly with reports from the various circles and three seven-minute addresses by Mrs. Dickson, Mrs. Evans and Mrs. F. Daly. In the evening a programme will be carried out, including an interesting address on the missionary work in the Northwest by Rev. James Woodworth, superintendent of the work in the Prairie Province.

The "Ys."

At the semi-monthly meeting of the Young Women's Christian Temperance Union held in the "Y" rooms the subject chosen for the Bible reading was "Praise."

The reports of the different departments were received. The total evening attendance at the rooms during the month was 535. The King's Daughters in connection with the association have been doing good work in visiting the sick and poor and attending to their wants. The opening lecture of the course arranged for by the "Ys" was delivered on Tuesday evening, and was a marked success in every way. As all the lectures of the course promise to be most interesting, it is expected that each one will be as largely attended as was the last.

Supposed Horse Stealing.
Wm. Simpson, a farmer from Lobo township, came to the city on Saturday, and during the day he met David Joyce and Thos. McDougall, two young men from Komoka. After spending the day around town Simpson started home alone, and when about five miles from the city stopped at a hotel and went in, tying the horse outside. An Oddfellow's Funeral.

The last sad rites attending the laying to rest of the remains of the late Wesley W. Osborne were conducted on Saturday afternoon. Deceased being a member of Dominion Lodge, No. 48, I. O. O. F., the funeral was conducted by that order. Services at the house were held by Rev. W. J. Clark, of the First Presbyterian Church, who also officiated at the grave. The impressive service of the Oddfellows was read by W. Angus, N. G., and Walter Fairbairn, P. G., and they were supported by a large number of the members who attended in procession and marched to the cemetery (Mount Pleasant). The Retail Grocers' Association also attended in a body.

D. D. C. M. Jesse Symonds acted as marshal, and the pallbearers were Bros. J. E. Sanders, C. J. Wall, T. H. Lashbrook, Geo. Pierce, F. Marsh, R. H. Johnston, H. J. Boyd, jun., and Thos. D. Hastings. There were many beautiful floral offerings, and everything connected with the sad event tended to show the esteem in which deceased had been held by his numerous friends and their spontaneous sympathy for the bereaved young widow and family.

During the service at the grave one of the teams attached to a coupe was startled by a sudden gust of wind and ran away. A crossbar was broken by their colliding with a tree, but otherwise no damage resulted.

London Actress in England—"Robin Hood" To-Night—"Playmates."
A LONDON ACTRESS IN ENGLAND.

The doctor told his patient she had an attack of pleurisy, and advised her not to play for a couple of days. She did play, however, on Tuesday and Wednesday nights, but yesterday the doctor told her she must rest for one night at least, or he would not answer for the consequences. Mme. Modjeska then gave in, and sent word to the theater to dismiss the audience.
