SOCIALIST EXPELLED

Unseated for Governor in a Fight With Syracuse Types.

Syracuse, Sept. 11.—Charles H. Corcoran, the Socialist candidate for governor of New York State in the late state election, is involved in a fight with Typographical Union No. 55, of which he has been a member up to a few weeks ago. Mr. Corcoran was charged with having used in his socialistic speeches sentiments derogatory to the union of which he was a member, and from which he was working card. He was suspended from the union until a fine was paid. He paid no attention to this, and was expelled and discharged from Lyman Bros., where he was employed as a printer. This was done at the instigation of the union.

Mr. Corcoran, through his attorney, procured a temporary injunction from Justice Scripture at Rome, restraining the union from interfering with his employment. The writ is returnable on Sept. 21. He also asks for a writ of mandamus to compel the return to him of his working card, and seeks the officers of the union for \$3,000 damages. The suit is against Arthur A. Hay, president of the union, and Thomas M. Cafney, Andrew J. Moynihan, Fred H. Brown, James McCormick, and John H. Hatch as executive committee, and John J. Gilson.

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MISS GOLDMAN TOLD STORIES

She Denied Her Identity When Arrested.

Calls Czolgosz a Fool—Denies Plotting and Says She Never Advocated Violence.

Chicago, Sept. 10.—Emma Goldman, whose speeches are alleged to have fired the brains of Leon Czolgosz, the would-be assassin of President McKinley, was arrested shortly before noon.

Miss Goldman's manner was defiant as she was led into the office of Chief of Police O'Neil, but she disclaimed all knowledge of Czolgosz and his crime, admitting only that she met him in Chicago July 12.

"Do you know that your words are what shot the president?" she was asked. "I do not," she never advocated violence.

"I was leaving for Rochester via Buffalo, when Czolgosz had a few words with me. He said he had heard me lecture in some memorial hall in Cleveland last May and that he wanted to know me."

"He said he knew I was in Chicago and looked me up. I had only a few words with him. He said that his complexion was light."

"Then how do you know that this man is the one who tried to kill the president?"

"Oh, with a shrug of the shoulders, 'I guessed that from what the newspapers say.'"

"What did you think when you heard that an attempt to kill the president had been made?" the woman was asked.

"With a wave of her hands and another shrug of the shoulders she answered disdainfully."

New York, Sept. 11.—The Central Labor Union at its weekly meeting passed resolutions denouncing the shooting of the president and expressing sympathy with Mrs. McKinley. Then the delegates went on to talk of the Journal and its editorial cartoons.

"Those cartoons are calculated to inspire hatred and contempt for this government," said Delegate Farrell. "How far they are from inspiring anything but a feeling of discontent I cannot undertake to say, but they are bound to have an effect on weak-minded people. 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PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION

Lesson Learned From the Death of Garfield.

Circumstances Attending His Assassination and the Previous Murder of Abraham Lincoln.

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Three presidents of the United States have fallen at the hands of assassins within the last thirty-six years.

President Lincoln was shot at 9 o'clock on the night of April 14, 1865, and died at 7:22 on the morning of April 15, 1865.

President Garfield was shot on the morning of July 2, 1881, and died on the morning of September 19, 1881.

The shooting of President McKinley has occurred just six months and two days after his second accession to the presidency.

From the moment President Lincoln received the bullet of Wilkes Booth there was no prospect of his recovery. His devoted wife and members of the cabinet remained with him through that memorable night, when all Washington was in a state of excitement over the attempts on the life of Lincoln and Seward.

Garfield was shot at the Pennsylvania railroad station in Washington as he and Secretary Faine were about to depart for Long Branch. As the two distinguished men were passing the station, a man named John Wilkes Booth, who was disguised as a doctor, stepped forward and fired two shots into the open air. Mr. Blaine saw a man running and started toward him to prevent a further attempt.

At a moment afterward the assassin, Charles J. Guiteau, was discovered and was rescued with difficulty. The man was taken to the hospital, in answer to his eager question his physicians informed Mr. Garfield that he had a chance in a hundred of living.

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22, 1881, before Judge James R. Brady, of the New York supreme court. He again took the oath before Chief Justice Waite at Washington. His right to succeed to the presidency was established by the constitution. The defect in existing laws being sharply brought to the attention of congress a line of succession was adopted. This is fixed by chapter four of the acts of the forty-ninth congress, first session. After the president comes the vice-president as secretary of state, secretary of the treasury, secretary of war, attorney-general, postmaster-general, secretary of the navy, and secretary of the interior. Since this act the office of secretary of agriculture was created.

This act applies only to such cabinet officers as shall have been appointed by the advice and consent of the senate, and are eligible under the constitution to the presidency.

The acting president on taking the oath of office must convene congress, if not then in session, in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice.

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
