British Government Sends Relief to St. Vincent and Martinique.

\$30,000 RECEIVED AT MANSION HOUSE

Enthusiastic Crowd Attends the Anti-Corn Tax Meeting—Russian Quarrel With Corea.

FOR WEST INDIAN SUFFERERS.

London, May 16.—Mr. Balfour announced yesterday in the commons the measures which had been adopted by the government for the relief of the people of St. Vincent and Martinique.

Mr. Dillon failed in an attempt to move the adjournment of the house in order to discuss the matter, but he undoubtedly scored a point when he stated, for Mr. Balfour's edification, that the house had voted £100,000 for the relief of the sufferers by the Lisbon earthquake in 1755. There was a precedent for the government. The first lord of the treasury thought, however, that the earthquake was not a sufficiently recent occurrence. The government was not prepared to grant a vote, but would let the lord-mayor receive subscriptions for the relief of distress in the British island, and would send provisions and medical comforts for the unfortunate people in the French colony. Already £5,000 has been received at the Mansion House in response to the lord mayor's appeal.

ANTI-CORN TAX MEETING.

The meeting called by the Cobden Club to protest against the corn tax was held last night in Free Trade Hall, Manchester. Mr. Asquith was the principal speaker, and the hall, which has seating accommodation for 5,000 people, was crowded with an enthusiastic audience.

GREAT CENTRAL STOCKS IN DEMAND.

There was renewed interest for Great Central Railway yesterday. The demand is due to the expectation that

the railway will profit if an arrange-

ment should be arrived at between the Mogan syndicate and the Manchester Ship Canal Company.

RUSSIAN QUARREL WITH KOREA.

The Cologne Gazette publishes a telegram from St. Petersburg stating that difficulties have arisen between Russia and Korea. Telegraph poles which the Russians erected have been taken down by Koreans, and the Russian representative has demanded satisfaction from the Korean government, on the ground that the action of the Koreans constitutes a violation of international rights.

LAVA DUST FLIES 1,200 MILES.

The Daily Mail's dispatch from Kingston, Jamaica, says lava dust is falling in fairly large quantities on the highest points of the island, and less on the plains. It is estimated that about 50 tons per day are falling, presumably borne from St. Vincent on the trade wind. The distance covered is 1,200 miles. The dust can be seen falling in a blue haze above the peaks like blue flame. The weather is curious. The sun rises every morning perfectly white. The phenomenon is causing much speculation, especially among superstitious natives.

DECORATIONS FOR ALFONSO.

Madrid, May 16.—King Alfonso was invested with a number of foreign decorations this morning. The ceremony took place in throne room of the palace. The king was surrounded by a brilliant assemblage of high officers of state. Among the orders bestowed upon him was that of the garter, which he received from the Duke of Connaught, as the representative of King Edward.

The queen regent yesterday received in audience the foreign missions appointed to attend the coronation of King Alfonso. Her majesty and chiefs of the missions exchanged the most cordial expressions of esteem.

MUTINY AND BREAD RIOTS.

Constantinople, May 16.—The Turkish garrison at Monastir, Macedonia, has mutinied, and the soldiers have started serious rioting. They have seized the telegraph office, whence they issue clamorous demands to the port for the arrears of their pay.

Bread riots have broken out in Aleppo, in the northern part of Syria, in consequence of the increase in the price of this food due to the operation of speculators in grain.

Washington, May 16.—Dr. Franz A. R. Jung, Lord Pauncefote's physician, said today regarding his patient's condition: "With each attack he has new complications. The outlook is not so bright, but he is distinctly in no immediate danger."

FISSURES IN THE MOUNTAIN SIDE

Soufriere Still Showing Signs of Activity.

ISLANDERS NOT OUT OF DANGER

No One Able to Go Within Eight Miles of the Volcano's Mouth—Race of Natives Wiped Out.

Kingston, Island of St. Vincent, Tuesday, May 15.—The numerous fissures in the Soufriere Mountain's sides continue to throw out vapor, and the subterranean murmurings and tremblings indicate continued unrest. During the afternoon of Monday a dense volume of steam and smoke rose from the volcano, and the whole island was covered by a peculiar moisture.

SICKNESS SPREADS.

The inhalation of noxious vapors here is increasing the spread of sickness. An ambulance corps from the island of Barbadoes has arrived here. Starvation threatens the poor class of the afflicted district. Nearly every remaining negro huts in the Caribbean contains dead bodies, and the horrible stench is driving people away. Mutilated bodies are tied with ropes and dragged to trenches where they are buried. Sometimes bodies are cremated.

The local government is feeding and sheltering about 3,000 refugees. Subscriptions for the relief of the sufferers are being raised in all the British West Indian Islands.

VEILED IN FIRE.

Fort-de-France, May 15.—The situation on St. Vincent is veiled behind a wall of fire. Nobody can approach the neighborhood of the volcano of Soufriere, and it is certain that all within a radius of several miles of the fire-spouting mountain are dead.

Among the other victims are the last Carib aborigines of these islands. Word of the destruction of the Carib people has reached the mainland.

The British fostered the remnant on St. Vincent and helped them maintain this village. There were only a few dozen of them. So this volcanic upheaval has

WIFED A RACE FROM THE EARTH

for there is not now a Carib alive in the world. An old Indian prophecy that the Caribs would be sacrificed to the fire god which they worshipped has thus been fulfilled. Of the Caribs only a few individuals remain on the islands of St. Lucia and Dominica.

There is intense suffering all over

on St. Vincent resulting from the

eruptions. The estate of Wallibou has disappeared, but has been replaced by an inlet of the sea.

Richmond, an estate formerly adjacent to Wallibou, which was formerly flat, and upon which there was a number of laborers' cottages, has been completely destroyed.

It is believed that the Rabacud crater in the Windward district of the island has also erupted.

CAPPED BY DARK CLOUDS.

La Soufriere, though less violent, still wears a cap of dark clouds, which is illuminated every now and then by flashes of red light. Volcanic dust fell here again Sunday, but fortunately there have been also several heavy rainshowers which have washed away the dust from the grasses and restored the verdure
