Communication With Orient by Way of Bering Straits and Siberia.

Scattle, Wash., Nov. 23. - Cable and

elegratic communication with Sieria, the Orient and the old world countries by way of Bering Strait, is proposed by John Rosene, managing Cairneross & Lawrence, director of the Northeastern Siberian Company. He intimates that if the United States Government will extend its Nome telegraph line from Nome on establish the wireless system across Bering Strait, between Cape Prince of Wales and East Cape, the nearest point of the Siberian side, the intervening distance being only from 28 to 35 miles, that the Northeastern Siberian Company will build an overland telegraphic line across Northeastern Siberia, for the whole of which it holds a concession from the Russian Imperial Government, to a connection ith the telegraph line extending the full length of the Trans-Siberian Railway from Vladivostock to St. Petersburg. This would place, by means of existing cable connections, Japan, Thina, the Philippines, Korea, Manchuria, and other Far East countries, as well as all of those of the Continent of Europe in cable and telegraphic ommunication with all points on the North and South American Continents
