of Port Arthur is as follows: On the eastward of the stronghold from Takushan to Wolff Mountains the country is in the occupation of the Japanese, who have mounted 309 heavy guns, besides their field artillery. The guns include ten 6-incl quick-firing, manned by a naval brigade, and also weapons brought from the principal ports of Japan. They are able to shell the town. The Russians, besides their heavy guns, have constantly at work 100

light pieces of quick-firing artillery. To the westward from Etseshan fort, which has been captured, a road leads to the parade ground, but the Japanese infantry is unable to advance on account of the land mines. Pigeon Bay fort has been taken, but the Liautishan fort still is in the






