BRITISH PARLIAMENT DIS-SOLVED.

The British Parliament was dissolved today. The politing will begin on Saturday, and will extend seventeen days. This absurd system is continued by the grace of the House of Lords. It enables most of the plural votes to be polled, and the bulk of these go to the Unionist party. In the last election one plural voter cast 25 ballots by incessant travelling.

There are 90,000 more voters in the United Kingdom than in January last. They number 7,705,717 of whom 6,221,-722 are in England, 785,208 in Scotland, and 698,787 in Ireland. Only a few members will be elected on the first Think of the many ways I try to save day's polling, but 200 will be returned on the second and third days, and these will indicate, as in January, the drift of public sentiment.

The King's speech dissolving Parliament is cryptic in its brevity. It gives no clue to the course the crown will take after the election, and none was expected. But either the Prime Minister has guarantees that the King will follow the advice of his ministers if they are sustained by the country, or he (Mr. Asquith) has receded from the position he took seven months ago He made the following declaration on April 14, at the passing of the anti-

veto resolutions: "If we do not find ourselves in a position to insure that statutory effect shall be given to the policy in this Parliament, we shall then either resign our offices or advise a dissolution of Parliament. But in no case could we advise a dissolution except under such conditions as will secure that in the new Parliament the judgment of the people as expressed at the elections shall be

carried out. The Government has advised a dissolution, which means that it has the royal guarantees, if Mr. Asquith is of the same mind as in April. But the Premier himself has pledged himself to secrecy, and the situation will not be clarified until the election is over
