London, April 11 .- Another literary scanda! has come to light. It has recently been discovered that "L'Amour Masque," a story by Balzac, only lately published for the first time, is almost identical in plot, detail and even phrasing with a tale called "Le Domby a certain Moleri, which was published in the Mbgerasin Littaire in 1845.

The resemblance between the two stories is far too close to be accounted The questions then for by chance. arise, Was Moleri a nom de guerre assumed by Balzac, or did Balzac steal from Moleri, if Moleri did not steal from Balzac? Or again, Is the Balzac manuscripts "L'Amour Masque," pre-sented to the Duchesse de Dino and emblazoned with her coat-of-arms, a literary forgery?

M. Pierre Lavedan, who found the Molerl story in the old magazine, declares that Moleri was a real person, who wrote plays and held a small pub-lic office. The Balzac manuscript again, seems to be well authenticated. Bleriot added that it will be necessary to find a man of enough resistance and energy to complete the journey. He declared that among his pilots he has two men who are capable of reaching the goal.

London, April 11 .- In 1911 the numper of applications for patents at the British patent office was 38,186, of which 598 were made by women. The report of the Comptroller-General, touching on the trend of invention during the year, says:
