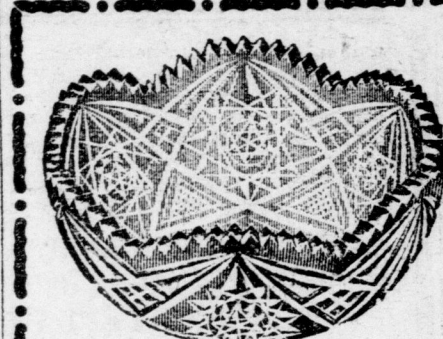

In Comatose Condition.

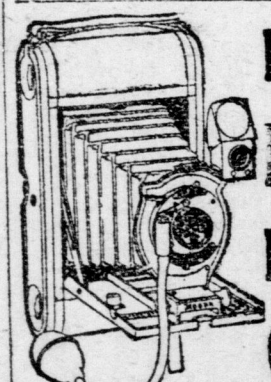
Mr. Henry Mahon, of 59 Wilson

Child Improves.

Hospital today. It was at first feared
that she could not recover because
of the fact that she lost a great
quantity of blood from a wound in-
flicted on her side. She is now pro-
gressing very favorably, however.

A London Case.

At Osgoode Hall, in trial court, be-
fore Britton, J., Harrison vs. Knowles,
an action on twelve promissory notes
for \$100 each. Judgment: There is
nothing in defendant's contention that
the plaintiff cannot bring this action
upon the notes because of the agree-
ment executed by the parties by
which the title remained in plaintiff's
name until paid for. The plaintiff
has not taken possession nor at-
tempted to do so. He has the right to
sue upon the notes, notwithstanding
that agreement. The plaintiff is en-
titled to judgment for \$1,200 with in-
terest at 6 per cent. upon \$1,120, from
date of notes to date of entry of judg-
ment with costs of action. The de-
fendants are entitled to \$80 upon their
counter-claim. As this \$80 may be
set off against plaintiff's claim as of
date of notes it is equivalent to allow-
ing interest on the \$80. The defend-
ants will get costs upon their coun-
ter-claim. Thirty days stay.

UNION MOTHERS' CLUBS WANT A CURFEW IN LONDON

Members Placed Themselves on
Record at a Meeting on
Friday Night.

The Union Mothers' Club of London
put themselves on record in favour
in favor of having a curfew in this
city, at a largely attended meeting,
held on Friday night in the Alexandra
school.

Mrs. (Dr.) Hughes gave a most in-
teresting talk on the influence of
the curfew in keeping children off
the streets after 8 or 9 o'clock at night.

"We are not in favor of the curfew
in London because we think it is one
of the worst cities, but because we want
it to be the very best city in Canada."
Mrs. Hughes stated, "We think that
a street education does not tend to de-
velop the best type of girls or boys,
physically, mentally or morally." Mrs.
Hughes further said that an argument
sometimes advanced against the curfew
was that some homes were not fit
for children to be in during the even-
ing, but these were the exceptions and
not the rule.

SAYS CITY SOLICITOR'S OPINION IS WRONG

Mr. W. R. Bartram Holds That
Election May Be Voided
on Proceedings.

Mr. W. R. Bartram, barrister,
writes:

"I am of the opinion that the city
solicitor's opinion is wrong.

"The additions of territory is gov-
erned by section 24, of the municipal
act of 1903, as amended by section 1,
sub-section 24, act of 1906, which
provides that the additions shall be
made on conditions as may be agreed
upon or shall be determined by the
Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council. The
powers of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-
Council are conferred on the board by
section 53, act of 1906.

"Section 102, of act of 1903, relied
upon by Mr. Meredith, does not af-
fect this question. It provides for
resolutions before July 15, as did origi-
nal section 24. The board had no ju-
risdiction under this section, as the
resolutions for additions were, I un-
derstand, not made before July 15,
1903.

"In my opinion the three additional
aldermen are irregularly elected, and
can take and hold office until the
election is declared void on proceed-
ings to be taken within six weeks
after the election, or one month after
acceptance of office.

"The election of the whole fifteen
aldermen is irregular and voidable.
The city solicitor is responsible for
the complication in not instructing
the city clerk before the election."

MAN WAS HURT BY FALL FROM A HACK

Mr. Frank Maker Was Thrown From
Rig When Horse Shied.

Mr. Frank Maker, of 732 Pimlico ave-
nue, was thrown from his seat and sus-
tained a fracture of the shoulder blade
when a horse attached to a wagon in
which he was riding with Joseph Gill-
gan, shied at the steam from the C. P.
trainhouse on Quebec street yester-
day afternoon.

The injured man was attended by Dr.
Edwin Scabner, and will be laid up for
a considerable time.

Mr. Maker and Mr. Gilligan were re-
turning to the city along Quebec street
when the horse, driven by Mr. Gilligan,
took fright and shied.

Mr. Maker and Mr. Maker lurched from
his seat to the sidewalk. Gilligan soon
gained control of the animal, however,
and after proceeding a few feet returned
and drove the injured man to his home.

BUILD UP BREAKWATER

Real Estate Would Do Work by
Means of a Giant Dump.

At the meeting of the Real Estate
Owners' Association held last evening,
resolutions were passed favoring the
issuance by the city of short term 5
per cent debentures, to be purchased
by citizens, and also advising the
council to utilize the earth and
stone structures in building up the
breakwater.

The resolutions are:

"Resolved, that, whereas all the
leading financiers have given repeat-
edly and unanimously their opinion in
favor of the issuance of debentures to
cure the money market, and the
better proof has been shown than by
the recent sales of civic issues, that
in the opinion of the Real Estate As-
sociation, the issue of a straight 5 per
cent in small size debentures and of-
fer at par to citizens only, say the
whole set of city hall issues and in
this manner give all citizens a safe and
profitable investment and in this way
advise the money kings that insofar as
London is concerned, we are not at
their mercy."

"Resolved, that, in view of the very
large amount of work and other simi-
lar refuse together with the earth that
will come from new building ex-
cavations that there will be sufficient
dumping to effectually raise and
widen the London West dyke, it ap-
plied properly during the next five
years, to make the exposed part flood
proof at absolutely no cost to the
property owners of that section on a
frontage basis or to the general tax-
payers. In this way several million
tons can be obtained that otherwise
cannot readily find space."

laws, involving \$58,000, will also be
submitted to the people.

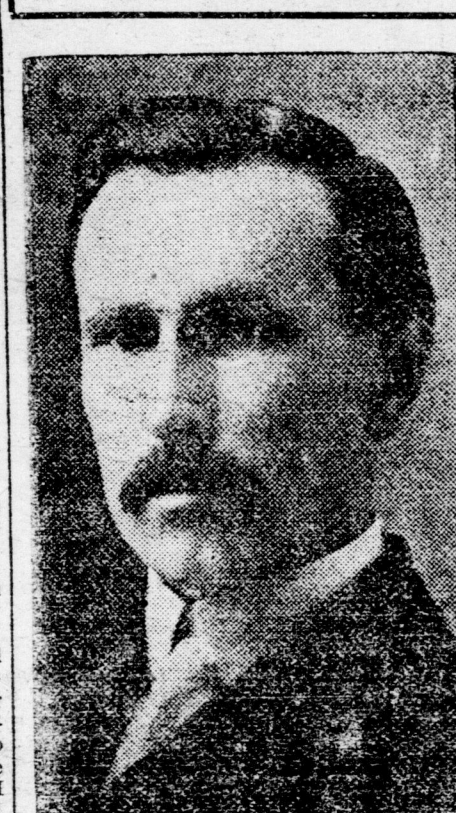
Buying Milk.

LONDON FIRM SELLS TO BRANTFORD CO.

H. A. Britton Company Plant Will Go
to the Telephone City.

The H. A. Britton Company, of this
city, manufacturers of overalls, etc.,
have disposed of their business and
plant to the Kitchen Overall and Shirt
Company, of Brantford.

For some time, the Britton Company
have not been doing business, and the
partnership existing between S. B. Gor-
don, J. E. McGuffin and H. A. Britton
was dissolved. It was decided to win-
dle the company, and after negotiating
for some time with the Kitchen Com-
pany, it was decided to sell.

The machinery, etc., will be removed
to Brantford, where the company will
manufacture their goods.
Mr. McGuffin made the announce-
ment today that the Britton Company
had sold out.

NO ORANGE SCARCITY

Dealer Tells The Advertiser That the
Situation Now Is Normal.

A number of wholesale fruit dealers
this morning denied the report that
oranges would be scarce in London for
the remainder of the winter, and also
the statement that there would be a
sharp advance in the price of all
oranges sold in the city.

One dealer when questioned by The
Advertiser as to the rumor, said:
"There is no truth in the statement.
The situation this year is almost the
same as that of last winter. Last win-
ter the frost in California was more
severe than that of this year, and there
was no scarcity in London. The sup-
ply will be large enough to satisfy the
demand, and there will be no great ad-
vance in the prices. I do not think
that they will differ more than a cent
or two throughout the winter. There
will be a number of carloads of oranges
that have been shipped by the frost
shipped into London, but as the price
for these is less than for those that are
untouched, there will be a good sale
for them. The only difference between
the two is that the ones touched by
the frost have a slight bitter taste."
