

REV. A. J. JOHNSTON SAYS FAREWELLS

Leaves Dundas Centre Methodist Pastorate for Victoria College Work.

WORLD CRUSHED BY DRINK

In Morning He Tells Parishioners of Necessity of Foregoing Visionary Ideals.

Farewell sermons in Dundas Centre Methodist Church were preached yesterday by Rev. A. J. Johnston, who is leaving London to accept a professorship in Victoria College, Toronto.

At the morning service, Rev. Mr. Johnston preached from the text, St. Matthew, xvi, 4, "Let us make here three tabernacles; one for thee, one for Moses, and one for Elias." Jesus had taken the three disciples, Peter, James and John, up into the mountain top, where he was transfigured, and Moses and Elias appeared unto them. Peter had seen Jesus, the lowly teacher, going about, humbly doing good, the Christ of Galilee, the Christ of Samaria, but he could hardly believe that this was the Messiah. If the people, however, could have seen the Saviour's transfiguration and glory, if the disciples could have seen with them the story of it to the people, Peter thought that many conversions would be made, that all would be ready to acknowledge the Saviour. As a reminder of the glory of the mountain top, where Jesus and Elias appeared with him in the glory, but when the bright cloud had passed away there remained only Jesus, whom the voice from heaven proclaimed as the Son of God. This was the real Saviour, the Christ who went about healing the sick and helping the poor and suffering. This was the mistake that the Christian church was making, said Rev. Mr. Johnston. The world was being neglected, while the church was idly enjoying the glory and inspiration.

"The world is crushed under the power of drink, under the power of sin, and the power of the devil, while we are away off somewhere saying our prayers and getting into a high ecstasy and a high emotion," said Mr. Johnston.

"I do not condemn the mountain top experience. The man who has known it can best be the servant of mankind, but he must not stay up there. The mountain top is to Christian service as the dynamo is to the motor, or the gasoline tank is to the automobile, and as Pentecost was to the healing of the sick, and the saving of the people that followed the Pentecostal experience.

"If a year has gone by, and I have, in the hands of God, been the means of bringing new visions to you to the mountain top, where you have caught new visions and new glimpses of the life of God, I have done you worse than good. If I consider that is the end of my work, and I have not stimulated you to new zeal in your Christian service and your work for the betterment of humanity. The surest way to petrify the human heart is to stir up its emotions and then give it nothing to do."

Rev. Mr. Johnston expressed regret at leaving London after a brief pastorate. He would have liked to have had the call to collegiate service come at the close of three or four years of pastoral work at Dundas Centre. But he had not sought his new appointment, and he thought he should obey the call. He was grateful to the members and hosts of the choir for their co-operation and loyal assistance in the work of the past year.

SYNOD ENDORSED ABOLITION OF BAR

Hamilton-London Organization Has Demanded Reform That is "As Certain as That God Lives."

The Advertiser interviewed Rev. Dr. D. L. McCrae, the moderator of the Synod of Hamilton and London of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, in regard to the action of that body at its recent meeting on the question of abolishing the bar. Dr. McCrae has been for some time under the care of his physician, and is taking a rest and vacation.

In answer to questions, the Moderator said: "The Synod has for many years passed the strongest resolutions in favor of abolishing the bar." "This year," said Dr. McCrae, "the Synod passed unanimously and enthusiastically the following resolutions: 'That we reaffirm our position in relation to the abolition of the bar, as most truly reflecting the sentiments of our people.'"

"That we regard it as a religious duty, incumbent upon every minister, to give clear and emphatic teaching, both in the pulpit and Sunday school, on the great moral issues before our church and country, which is presented by the present situation, with regard to temperance."

"That," said Dr. McCrae, "in what our great Presbyterian Church in Synod assembled tell its people on the temperance question, and its ministers as to their pulpits duty."

"And the Synod in line with all the churches, religious and temperance organizations, has been doing the same thing for the past ten years."

"As a minister of God, with the sanction of approval of the church with which I am connected, I have been pleading from the pulpit for the abolition of the open bar room for 35 years. We are all agreed, as ministers of every church, that the 'Abolish the Bar' policy is the social, moral and spiritual wellbeing of our people."

"Now, all kinds of abuse is heaped upon us, and we are told we must stop all this work in which we have been engaged for years."

"Well," said Dr. McCrae, "the bar is going to be abolished. Make no mistake about that. It is certain, as it is that God lives. And the time is not far off either."

PASTOR PLEADS AGAINST SIN OF INDIFFERENCE

Rev. W. R. McIntosh Reminds His Congregation of the "Curse of Meroz."

Rev. W. R. McIntosh of the King Street Presbyterian Church, preached a forceful sermon on the abolition of the bar last night, taking as his subject "The Curse of Meroz."

"The history of Meroz," said the speaker, "is unknown, but its sin is plainly told. It is the sin of indifference. The sin of doing nothing when a great cause is calling for help. The sin, according to God's Word, on which the light of heaven most heavily falls. We are not told the cause of their indifference. It may have been pride or party spirit, or it may have been sheer cowardice and indolence. No matter the cause, now we need to beware ourselves lest we fall under this blight. Preachers who judge with conscience through fear of pewholders; churches that remain neutral lest revenue be lost; political parties that cultivate a neutral enthusiasm lest votes should be alienated; political partisans who swallow their convictions to gratify party prejudice."

"Both political parties are trying in this present struggle to convince the electorate that they are the real friends of temperance," continued Mr. McIntosh. "Who is to be judge?"

"The liquor people have made up their minds. They vote for the party with which they usually join the church with the least religion in it. The churches have made up their minds, most unthinkably."

"Here is what the church you and I belong to," said Mr. McIntosh, "declared only a few days ago, in an assembly of 400 and without a dissenting voice: 'We would urge all ministers and congregations throughout the Dominion to set principle before party and to unite by vote and influence in the support of this movement for the immediate abolition of the open bar.'"

DR. STEVENSON'S ADDRESS TO LONDON HEBREWS

Remarks on Liquor Traffic Received With Applause by Audience.

Dr. W. J. Stevenson, the local Liberal candidate, addressed a large audience of Hebrews in the Horton Street Church on Sunday afternoon on the liquor traffic question. He said:

"Look at our jails, prison farms, asylums and police stations filled to capacity as the result of drink. Let us show a better example to our own and other people's children and lift our nation from disgrace."

Dr. Stevenson recalled a recent incident when he was halted into court house where he was visiting a patient for longer than the time allowed. The policeman who summoned him, he said, apparently had not noticed that on the opposite corner to that at which his car was standing a number of drunks were piling out of the rear door of a saloon. The audience applauded the doctor to the echo, evincing great interest in his statements.

INQUIRY INTO EMPRESS DISASTER AT AN END

Counsel Seek To Place Blame—Newcombe Thinks Each Share It.

[Canadian Press.] QUEBEC, June 28.—The Empress of Ireland wreck inquiry was yesterday afternoon adjourned sine die to allow of the commission considering its finding. The last day was marked by an able address to the commission by C. S. Haigh, who has conducted the case from the point of view of the owners of the Storstad, the collier which rammed the Empress, a reply by Butler Aspinall, K.C., who has acted for the C. P. R., and a general review of the evidence by Edmund T. Newcombe, K.C., who has represented the Dominion Government. Mr. Aspinall said that he could not understand why Mr. Haigh had indicted Captain Kendall, when, if it was true that the steering gear had broken down, he could not be blamed for the collision and would have absolutely no reason to com-

mit perjury. He invited the court to find against one or the other boat, and not to blame both, and he thought the Storstad was at fault.

Thinks Both To Blame.

Mr. Newcombe said that probably neither the officers of the Storstad nor the Empress had intentionally lied. He thought, however, that they were both to blame, the Storstad for having ported her helm in a fog, and the Empress for stopping when the navigation regulations only called for her to slow up. He suggested that the rapid foundering of the Empress was due to the watertight doors not being closed. In a large measure, he thought, if it was found that port-holes had enabled water to reach the interior of the ship, never again should it be possible for them to be a cause for disaster. They should be closed by a signal from the bridge the moment a fog appeared. The same applied to the watertight doors.

After thanking counsel for their close application to their several tasks, Lord Mersey adjourned the sittings of the commission.

INSTANTLY KILLED BY TOUCHING LIVE WIRE
