PRESS OF STATES PLEASED AT REPLY

Tribune Says Sir Edward Grey Is Reasonable and Friendly.

ISSUE NOT A MAJOR ONE

Very Different From Threat Implied in Germany's "War Zone" Note.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 18.—The Tribune this morning says editorially: "Sir Edward Grey's reply to our state department's protest against the inconveniences caused to American shippers by the detention of ships and the examination of cargoes destined to neutral ports is entirely reasonable and friendly in tone. The two governments, as we said when the preliminary reply was published several weeks ago, have no differences on questions of principle. The United States has itself set many precedents which Great Britain is now following in treating contraband going through a neutral territory to a belligerent. We do not challenge a free exercise of the right of search or a pretty large discretion of Great Britain's part in declaring what is and what is not contraband."

Arguments Conceded. "It will probably be conceded by most Americans that the German Government's action in taking control of all food supplies eliminates the normal distinction between food intended for the use of a belligerent's armed force and food intended for the civilian population. All food may thus become contraband under such conditions. Most Americans also recognize that the British prize courts will give a hearing on their merits to cases of seizure coming before them. Beyond that there is always the recourse of diplomatic intervention and arbitration."

Cut Red Tape. "All that this Government asks is the cutting of red tape and the prevention of undue delays in the exercise of the right of search and seizure. That is a grievance which can easily be made to yield to better administrative methods. The issue is not a major one—like that raised by the threat implied in the recent German 'war zone' proclamation. In Great Britain's case we are dealing with a power which still believes that questions affecting neutral rights can all be settled within the scope of the existing international law code."

No Effort Spared. "The World says: 'The formal reply of the British Government to the American protest against interference with neutral commerce is notably friendly in tone, and the facts recited will impress the reader with the truth of the assertion that no effort is being spared to avoid inflicting avoidable injury on neutral interests.'"

ADMIRAL JELlicoe HAS HAD ADVENTUROUS LIFE

Three Times Seriously Wounded—Immensely Popular With His Men.

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 18.—No popular sailor is so little known personally to the British public as Admiral Jellicoe. Yet, the admiral has an adventurous record and has three times in his career recovered from wounds that were at first believed to be fatal. Admiral Jellicoe comes of a family of French extraction, and his father was a sailor. As a midshipman, he excelled his fellows in his studies and attention to duty and won nearly all the prizes offered on his training ship. He took part in the bombardment of Alexandria, fought at Toulon, and had a narrow escape from drowning when the Victoria sank. He also fought during the Boxer rebellion in China. As an administrator his career was no less distinguished, for he served as director of naval ordnance and as controller of the navy. A writer describes him as a slender man, below average height, with calm grey eyes, and an air of perfect confidence. At the same time there is a lurking sense of humor in the lines about the eyes and mouth. In his small, wiry figure, he resembles the late Lord Roberts. Admiral Jellicoe has always been immensely popular with the enlisted men of the navy, by whom he is known variously as Jackey-Jon, Hellicoe Jack, and also as Silent Jack, from the fact he seldom speaks unless he wants something done.

GERMAN SOLDIERS ALLOWED ONLY BEER

Police Order Issued Against Sale to Them of Heavy Intoxicants.

[Canadian Press.] Berlin, Feb. 18.—While the proprietors of large cafes are pleading for an extension until 2 o'clock of the recent 1 o'clock closing order, on the grounds that they are facing ruin, the police are reported to be seriously considering the advisability of forbidding all afternoon cabarets and vaudeville theatres.

Falling to obtain satisfactory results merely by making appeals the police have issued an order "which becomes operative Friday, forbidding the sale to soldiers of all heavy intoxicants. Virtually everything but beer is placed under the ban."

BELGIAN REFUGEES MANUFACTURING KHAKI

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 18.—Hundreds of Belgian refugees, both men and women, are finding employment in the woolen mills at Huddersfield and neighboring towns, where thousands of yards of khaki for uniforms are turned out.

Every important mill in the Huddersfield district is working night and day, and the industry has been speeded up until it can go no faster.

SHOOTING MOTHER DEAD; TURNS WEAPON ON SELF

Winnipeg Man in Hospital in Serious Condition As Result of Shooting Affray in House.

[Canadian Press.] WINNIPEG, Man., Feb. 18.—Mrs. W. L. Stark, an elderly widow, is dead, and her son, George Stark, aged 30 years, is in the general hospital, as a result of a shooting affray at his home, 815 William avenue. It is believed that George Stark, after coming home early this evening, became involved in a quarrel with his mother and shot her with a revolver, and then turned the weapon on himself. He may recover.

DETROIT OFFICIALS SHIP AN AUSTRIAN BACK TO KINGSTON

Refuse To Take Care of An Alien Who Entered At That Port.

DETROIT, Feb. 17.—Detroit's first prisoner of war arrived in the city today, broke, without a bite to eat for three days, and unable to go further in his journey to Gary, Ind., where his wife and baby have mourned him as lost for two months. John Charochat, an Austrian metal worker, left Gary to accept a position in Seranton, early in December. He went by way of Detroit and started through Canada. At Kingston, he said, a squad of soldiers passed through the train, and he was taken to the military camp and his personal belongings and \$21 were taken from him, he says. Four days ago he was called to the office of Major F. F. Clarke, in command of the camp, and released. He was given a paper stating that he had been a prisoner of war and that he had been released by the Dominion authorities, and placed on a train for Detroit.

Here he applied to the police for aid. The commission promptly sent him to the depot with a police officer, who placed him on a train for Kingston. The commission declared that Detroit was no place for him and it was up to the Canadian authorities to look after him and see that he got to his home in Gary.

CONSPIRACY AFOOT TO DO DAMAGE TO LAKE STEAMSHIPS?

Northern Navigation Officials Hears Secret Society Plans Destruction.

[Special to The Advertiser.] SARNIA, Feb. 17.—The Northern Navigation officials are somewhat worried over their big steamers, which are lying at this port owing to rumors from the other side that a secret society is aiming to do damage. The officials are considering placing more watchmen on the boats. It is understood that the matter has been brought to the attention of both the Canadian and American authorities and that all developments are being closely watched. Local citizens do not take much stock in the matter.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS ENTER U. S. "ON DUTY"

SARNIA, Feb. 17.—For the first time in a hundred years, perhaps, Canadian soldiers on duty entered Port Huron, Mich. A squad of five men crossed by ferry this morning in full uniform.

They were forced by provisions of international law to leave their sidearms at the immigration office on the Canadian side. They were searching for Lance-Corp. Forrester, who deserted from London barracks.

Squads of soldiers were sent out to scour the country, and word being received that the man had headed towards Sarnia, a detachment was sent in pursuit. It was thought he might have crossed to Port Huron.

FOE'S SUBMARINE SINKS A STEAMER

Small French Boat Sent To Bottom—The Crew Ordered Off.

PARIS, Feb. 17.—2:45 p.m.—An official communication issued by the ministry of marine tells of the sinking yesterday by the German submarine U-16 of the French steamer Ville De Lille off the Barleur lighthouse, a short distance east of Cherbourg, after submarine had ordered the crew to leave the steamer. The statement follows: "The French steamer Ville De Lille, belonging to the Compagnie Navigation des Bateaux a Vapeur du Nord, sailing from Cherbourg to Dunkirk, sighted the German submarine U-16 near the lighthouse at Barleur at 1:30 o'clock yesterday. "The Ville De Lille endeavored to escape, but was outspeeded by the submarine, men from which boarded her and gave the crew ten minutes to leave in the ship's boats. They then sank the Ville De Lille by bombs placed in her interior. "The U-16 headed for a Norwegian steamer, but sank out of sight when a division of French torpedo boats from Cherbourg appeared on the horizon. "The Ville De Lille was a small steamer of 997 tons.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Feb. 17.—The German steamer Holger, with the crews and passengers of British steamers sunk in the Atlantic by German warships, arrived here today. Among those on board were the crew of the steamer Highland Brae, which sailed from London on Jan. 3 for Buenos Aires. She was a vessel of 1,634 tons, and belonged to the Nelson Steam Navigation Company, of London.

TRIES TO FIND WORK FOR BELGIAN REFUGEES

ROTTERDAM (via London), Feb. 17.—In order to approach "constructively" a solution of the problem presented by the idleness of a large portion of the population of Belgium, the war relief committee has inaugurated in Holland an experiment in the direction of providing ample and useful labor, to be compensated by food and clothing," according to a report given out at the foundation headquarters here tonight. "A group of 700 refugees, housed in a large emigrant hotel, in Holland, has been selected for the beginning," says the report. "As the chief need of the refugees in this camp and in all Holland is for underclothing, stockings and shoes, a small clothing establishment is being established, in which the women of the camp will make underclothing and stockings. "An effort is also being made to revive the lace industry, upon which about 40,000 women have depended for a livelihood."

MICHAEL SHEHAN DIES; WAS DEREHAM FARMER

Was Prominently Known as Scientific Dairyman.

INGERSOLL, Feb. 17.—Michael Shehan, 67 years of age, a prominent farmer of Dereham Township, died today, following a three weeks' illness of typhoid fever. The late Mr. Shehan was widely known as a progressive and industrious farmer. Through industry and frugality he had been very successful in material advancement, having accumulated several hundred acres of the finest agricultural land in the district. He gave considerable attention to scientific dairying and had one of the largest dairy herds in the township. Besides the widow he is survived by three sons, John, Charles and William, and two daughters, Mary and Lena, at home.

The funeral will be held Friday morning to the Church of the Sacred Heart, Ingersoll, thence to the Roman Catholic Cemetery. Mrs. Sylvester Hill's Funeral. The late Mrs. Sylvester Hill, whose death occurred at Pontiac, Mich., is being buried here and interred in the Harris Street Cemetery, was a lifelong resident of West Oxford. She was for many years an active member of the West Oxford Methodist Church. She possessed a kindly and sympathetic disposition, and readily gave assistance whenever it was required. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. L. W. Hill, of the Methodist Church, and the pallbearers were Messrs. John Mayberry, T. R. Mayberry, Robert Wilson, W. O. Edwards, B. C. Edwards and D. W. Clark.

The death occurred of Daniel John McGinnis at the family residence, corner of King and Whiting streets. He had been in impaired health for some time. He leaves a widow and grown-up family. He was 63 years of age.

LEGISLATURE'S TRIBUTE TO THE LATE PREMIER

Howland seconded the motion to adjourn, said it would be recognized that the most dominant figure in the Legislature and the Government was gone, and they would not be quite the same without him. Judged by the best of achievement, Sir James was a successful premier and party leader. The late premier's desk was crowded with roses for the afternoon. The desks of the two members of the Legislature on active service, Dr. A. E. Ross, of Kingston, who is now in France with the first contingent, and Mr. D. M. Hogarth, of Port Arthur, who is transport officer for the second contingent, were festooned with Union Jacks.

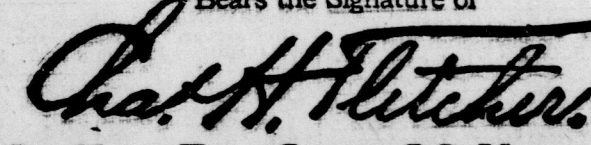
