RIDICULE MARCH OF INDIAN ARMY TO POINT PEELE

Canadian Mounted Police Find "Warriors" Brandishing Hoe and Spade.

DODGE ALONE EXCITED

Two Lone Troopers Left To Guard Government Park and All Its Marshlands.

LEAMINGTON, June 13.—If the few Indians who have "squatted" on land outside the government park at Point Pelee, are waiting for reinforcements from the Walpole Island Reserve, they are waiting in vain.

The "army" of 300 men, women and children, supposed to be advancing across southwestern Ontario, is assuredly a phantom one, for not one report of its having passed through any village or hamlet has been seen here.

On the Walpole Island Reserve all is tranquil. The Indians there are going about their daily tasks as usual. There is no serious agitation for a migration to Point Pelee; in fact there are not many Indians there who feel disposed to pick up whatever they can carry, leave behind homes which have taken years to establish, and "hike" over miles of dusty roads to a place where a permanent home would be an uncertainty.

Fifteen Potawatami Indians arrived in Sarnia Tuesday, intending to leave for the territory which a few of their number have laid claim to as their rightful possession under a treaty purported to have been made with the British in 1786, but when they were ordered back to the reservation by five Canadian Mounted Police, they retraced their steps without a murmur.

Work Peacefully.

Meanwhile the party already encamped outside the government park are following peaceful pursuits. They are not brandishing weapons and threatening to battle to the bitter end for their rights.

They are brandishing hoe and spade, preparing to plant a few acres of onions. The women are weaving baskets to pay rent for the land on which they are encamped.

About the only Indian who seems the least bit excited about the matter is young Archibald Dodge, who is alleged to be living in the hope that he will some day be chief of the three tribes and hold sway over the rich land around Point Pelee.

Members of the Dodge family are strong in their belief that they cannot be moved from the land on which they have settled. They claim it is theirs under the treaty. And yet they pay rent for it!

Canadian Mounted Police ridicule the idea that there is any trouble brewing or likely to brew.

They declare the tribes mentioned in connection with the long-heralded but still nebulous invasion to be nomads, wanderers who, if they wanted to, could not organize and move with an accord toward a set goal.

And by their actions they let it be known that such is their belief, for only two mounted troopers have been left to guard Point Pelee, its park and all the marshlands.

Over on the Walpole Reserve and around Alvinston, the chief event concerning the Indians is the death of the son of Grand Chief Moses Caldwell, who was killed in an auto accident in Mexico. The chief and all his warriors and people are awaiting the arrival of the body, and making preparation for the funeral, which will be held with all the rites of the Ojibwas.

White residents at Pelee do not object to the few Indians who have settled there. The new-comers are friendly and are quickly establishing relations with the few Indians who had previously been granted land in that vicinity by the government.

While Archibald Dodge explains why his people have a right to the land at Pelee, and denies reports that he is a member of the Six Nations Indians from the Tuscarora Reserve south of Brantford, the rest of the Indians go quietly about their daily chores, emitting an occasional "Ugh, Ugh," the white people continue to fish and till the land, and the red-coated "Mounties" stand silently by, not even being confronted with one law-breaker.

A few of the Indians want to hold a "pow-wow" with officials of the department of Indian Affairs at Ottawa, to consider the whole matter. However, nothing official regarding such a move has been received, for nothing of sufficient importance to

attract the attention of the powers-that-be has taken place.

Unbroken stillness reigns at Point Pelee and at Walpole Island. And the whole matter has become one for
