Canadian authors' week started today throughout the dominion. The movement, which is sponsored by book lovers, librarians, publishers and all those interested in the furthering of a national literature, aims to place before Canadians the work of their own writers.

Though there is a warm appreciation for the Canadian authors, which is proven by the demands for their work, Canadian authors' week has been instituted to increase the regard for and the meaning of the literature of the dominion.

Many fiction writers of the day are

Canadians, Among them are such well-known writers as James Oliver Curwood, Arthur Stringer, Frank Packard Marion Keith, Ralph Connor, Robert Stead, and others. Beckles Wilson, whose latest novel has been heralded as outstanding in

Canadian significance, is a Canadian who has won international praise. Another is Muriel Watson, whose 'Fire Weed" was one of last year's best sellers. "The Viking Heart," a story of the Scandinavian peoples of the west, is a further example.

Such developments are putting a national character into the country's stories, and it is to these develop-ments that authors' week is turning the attention of readers.

Canadian authors are beginning to hold their own not only with the readers of their own country but with Great Britain, United States and the world at large. Besides the large number of stories published in the States, there is a small but significant number published in England each




