The Anti-option Bill no longer threatens, Some gold has been engaged for export to-day, and more may be before Saturday's steamer sails, but generally and practically in every way, the financial situation has cleared. Scare crows, upon which the bear contingent has rallied most confidently, have all been knocked out. But unfortunately there is a new threat. Just when they ought to be behaving themselves, the western railroads are getting into snarls. Cutting rates or threatening to. About the only read out west which seems to be attending to its own business and making money out is the St. Paul. One new rate schedule issued to-day represents a cut of from twenty to twenty-five per cent. This is senseless, but that fact wont prevent it being burtful. The coal stocks maintain their favorable position. Reading stock and bonds have led the advances in to-day's market. There is no good reason why investors in these properties should be disappointed in expectations of large profits. The money market does not tighten as has been predicted by the bear crowd.




