IN FISHING LAWS

Federal Government Adopts Drastic Regulations Governing Fishing on Fraser

Many radical enanges in the federal egulations governing salmon fishing a British Columbia are made in the new rules issued yesterday in the Canada Gazette, but probably the most important is the total prohibition of all kinds of salmon fishing on the Fraser river from August 25 to September 15, inclusive. In many other respects the new regulations which it is believed were drafted on the recom-mendations of the mysterious and unobtainable report of the Fisheries commission are patterned after the regulations issued some months ago by

incial and federal fishing licenses, one of the most gratifying of the new rules is that declaring that the annual fee for a salmon fishing license shall be \$5, or just half the amount heretofore charged.

A new tax on canneries is also instituted but at the constituted but at the constituted for the constituted but at the constituted but at

stituted but at the same time the federal government takes a leaf out of the provincial regulations by declaring that no new cannery may be erected save by permission secured from the Minister of Fisheries. The tax placed on canneries is \$50 per annum, but on canneries is \$50 per annum, but canners welcome this if restrictions are to be placed on the establishment of new plants which mean greater competition and fewer fish all around. Another restriction which meets with the approval of canners is the restriction of all salmon nets to a length of 300 yards. Heretofore this has been the length in the Fraser river outside double that length has been allowed. The depth of nets is also restricted to 60 meshes. In the past a net might be any depth with the result that many on the narrow Fraser channels were so deep that they swept the bottom and the fish had no chance

at all of escape.

The extension of the weekly close season on the Fraser above New Westminster bridge by the provincial government is followed by the federal auernment is followed by the federal authorities with the announcement that only British subjects who are bona fide residents of either bank of the river above the bridge may fish above the bridge. In order to fish there these people must take out a special licence which, however, costs nothing extra. rapidity and that some of the lower lying land is already covered.
