

**P. EMILE COTE ELECTED
YESTERDAY TO
PROVINCIAL
HOUSE WITH BIG MAJORITY**

Fairly Heavy Polling In Nearly All Districts—Majority of Liberal Candidate Placed at Approximately 1400—A Sketch of The New Member—Should Be Well Fitted To Represent His Constituency.

French motorists are assured an unlimited supply of synthetic gasoline, according to the report of the Liquefied Fuel Congress. The product, it was said, was being obtained from plants of all kinds, even from the rough carbonization at low temperature of a mineral combustible.

To test the efficacy of the synthetic product a delegation from the congress, headed by the president of the first passing automobile, emptied its tank and refilled it with a synthetic combustible made from lignite, coke and water. A quarter turn of the throttle, and instantly the motor whirled smoothly and powerfully. It is claimed the synthetic gas gives 100 calories more than gasoline. Lignite has large deposits in the north and the south, and almost unlimited quantities of this synthetic fuel may be produced.
