Eldred Mowat is Run Over by Heavy Sloven on Tuesday.—Is Badly Hurt

On Tuesday evening young Eldred Mowat, son of Mr. and Mrs. Max M. Mowat, met with a serious accident near the lower wharf. A number of his companions had made to jump on a sloven belonging to Jones & Schofield, and driven by Duncan Chamberlain, and while the others had jumped on the back of the rig, he essayed to get on between the wheels. By some mischance, his foot slipped and he fell beneath the rear wheel sustaining severe injuries. In his fall he caught hold of one of the stanchions of the sloven and was dragged for a considerable distance before the driver was aware that anything was wrong. His companions were horror struck at the occurrence and could not warn the driver, who did not know of the tragedy going on behind. The lad was taken to Dr. Martin's, bleeding profusely, and then removed to his home. Although his injuries are of a very severe nature, he is to-day resting much easier and seems somewhat improved. On inquiry today, the Graphic was informed that the injured lad was a good deal better, and hopes are entertained that he is not so seriously injured as at first thought.

UP TO DATE EQUIPMENT The Great Northwest Telegraph Co. has just installed a new generating plant. The motor power is supplied by five motors and power is taken from the town service. These motors run dynamos which generate the electricity needed in telegraphing between here and Halifax and Montreal, as well as on the local lines, thus doing away with the old fashioned batteries. The new plant is one of the most up-to-date in operation in Canada.

MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL ON TUESDAY

Business Transacted and Interesting Letters Regarding O'Leary St. Road

The Town Council met on Tuesday evening in the Council Chambers, His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding. There were present at opening of session, Councillors Patterson, Quinn, Miller, Evans and Goss.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Communication read from Messrs. A. McLennan and A. D. McKendrick, with regard to water supply at the cemetery. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

Councillor McLennan then entered the meeting.

Tenders were then opened for the demolishing of the old power house buildings and clearing the site. One was received from Geo. E. Ross, offering to take down the buildings, and clear the site for \$200. Messrs. McLennan Foundry Co., tendered to take down the buildings and pay the sum of \$25 for all the old material including boilers, etc. On motion, the tenders were rejected, and the work ordered to be done by days work.

Deed was received of the Christopher property duly executed, and were approved and ordered to be recorded.

The deed of the Gerrard property was held over till the attendance of the Town Solicitor.

Petitions were received from Messrs. Arsenault and Doucet for four pool tables in premises on O'Leary Street and from A. J. Arsenault for one horse trucking license. Referred to Police and License Committee.

Reports were received from the following committees recommending payment of accounts, and were adopted.

Councillor Evans from Police and License Committee presenting report recommending that the application of Chief Hughes for holidays for officers be granted, and that each officer be allowed two weeks' holidays, beginning July 1st, and that Fidele Landry be appointed a Special Officer for relief duty in their absence at the rate of \$50 per month. Report was received and adopted.

His Worship then read some correspondence relative to O'Leary Street, after which Council adjourned.
