The bill providing for the annexation Riverside, and Brockton, passed by the Ontario legislature, has been printed.

The boundaries of St. Matthew's ward are as follows: Commencing at the intersection of the south limit of the Kingston road with the easterly side of the river Don; thence following the windings of the northerly limit of the allowance for road between the first and second concessions from the bay; thence easterly along the said northerly limit of the said allowance for roadway between the first and second concessions from the bay (commonly known as the Don and Danforth road) to its intersection with the easterly limit of the allowance for road between lots nine and ten; thence southerly along the said easterly limit of road between lots nine and ten, produced to its intersection with the south side of the Kingston road; thence westerly along the south limit of the Kingston road to the place of beginning. Immediately after the act comes into force, an election for three aldermen to represent the ward of St. Matthew in the city council is to be held, and two public school trustees are also to be elected for the ward. between the first and second concess
