WITH THE PRESBYTERIANS.

YESTERDAY'S DOINGS AT THE REFORMED ALLIANCE. A laudable Congregation—Examining the Points of the Armour—Wherein They Lack—the Source of Their Strength—All About the Reformation—Calvinism Praised—Renovation Wanted.

The proceedings of the Pan-Presbyterian Alliance were resumed yesterday morning at 10.30 o'clock in Cook's Church.

The papers were briefly discussed by Rev. Dr. Kerr of Edinburgh, Rev. Prof. Rentoul of Melbourne, Australia, and Rev. Dr. Parker of Belfast.

In the evening every nook and corner of the church was crowded. There was the additional attraction of a large and excellent choir under the leadership of Mr. Gorrie. Mr. Mortimer Clark presided.
