A cable from Greece states that in consequence of the demand from New York the market has advanced 1s. The Escolons, the last direct fruit steamer, is expected in Montreal next week. Teas are firm and selling, well; for low grade blacks and Ceylons an increased demand is reported and Japans are in good request. All low grade and medium teas in China blacks, Indian and Ceylons are from 1d to 2d higher. Good drawing and medium priced Darjeelings are very scarce. In coffees, Rios are again higher; No. 7 has touched the highest point in New York for months. Demand continues good. Brown Java coffees are still scarce; the scarcity of these is drawing grinders on to the light-colored grades. Canned vegetables are moving in moderate quantities only, while there is a fair demand for salmon at the higher prices. A better demand is reported for syrups; low grades are scarce and high. The spice market is firm. Pepper has advanced 3c a pound within the last two weeks and cloves are about 2c higher.
