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LAURIER'S REPLY TO FOSTER

THE LIBERAL LEADER ON EXPORT OF RAW MATERIALS.

He Desires to See Our Mines Worked Equally as Well as Farms—Better to Export Raw Materials Than to "Stand Firm."

OTAWA, Dec. 5.—An evening paper published an interview with Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, in which the Opposition leader said: "I suppose Mr. Foster thinks it better that our mines should be worked and our products landed, rather than that our people should make money by mining coal, iron ore and other minerals, and raising wheat, barley and cattle for the United States market..."

AT MELLÉ. Gathering of Storm That May Again Excite the Nation.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—A despatch from the Melilla correspondent of the United States, dated Monday, says: "Moorish caravans have been passing all day within a stone's throw of the Spanish lines at Guadalupe, but they were not to the fair at Frajuna, half a mile distant. It is feared that the meeting of so many caravans will again excite the Moorish element throughout the day, talking with the Spanish soldiers..."

MOONLIGHTERS ABROAD AGAIN. Farmer Daly's House in County Cork Attacked and the Inmates Stolen.

DUBLIN, Dec. 5.—The residence of Farmer Daly, near Bohernabreena, County Cork, was attacked by moonlighters, who beat the inmates in a savage manner. The attempts were made to light the railway trains near Londonderry by placing stones upon the rails. Neither was successful.

REVISED TENANTS. May Be Advised by the National League to Retain Their Holdings.

DUBLIN, Dec. 5.—Timothy Harrington, M.P., addressed a meeting of the National League in this city to-night. He said that the Government had shown no intention to carry out the commission's recommendations. The National League wished to keep the country peaceable as long as possible, but if peace was to be maintained only by keeping unprovoked evictions in force, the League would not be maintained by them.

NO PATRON WILLING TO STAND. West Elm P. of I. Vast to Secure a Candidate for His Ward.

DURTON, Ont. Dec. 5.—West Elm Patrons of Industry met in convention today to select a candidate for the next election of Ontario. A large number of representative farmers were in attendance. Twelve were nominated, but all declined the honor.

MINES AND LORD SALISBURY. The Compulsory Clause of the Employers' Bill Objected to.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Lord Salisbury this morning made a statement in the House of Commons regarding the proposed Bill for the regulation of mines. He stated that the compulsory clause of the Employers' Liability Bill, which would require employers to insure their employees against accidents, was objected to by many of the mining interests.

CHARGED WITH HIGH TREASON. The Spies Arrested at Kiel Will Be Tried Dec. 14.

BREITEN, Dec. 5.—The two spies who were arrested at Kiel with plans and photographs of German defenses, their conviction will be tried on the charge of high treason at Leipzig on Dec. 14. The charges against them are that they were in communication with the British and French governments, and that they had transmitted to them plans and photographs of German defenses.

CHRYSLER AND LORD SALISBURY. A Deputation Wrote Upon Dr. Mandell's Report of the Situation in the Congo.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The Central Chamber of Commerce appointed a deputation to wait on Right Hon. A. J. Mundell, President of the Board of Trade, to advocate the selling of grain by weight. Dr. Mandell said he favored the change, but that he would reserve his decision until he received deputations holding an opposite opinion that he expected would visit him.

BRITISH DEFENCES.

The Force at Malta and Gibraltar Not to Be Held in the Future.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—In the House of Commons Right Hon. H. Campbell-Bannerman, Secretary of State for War, replying to a question asked by Mr. Edward Gourley, a Liberal, said he was not consistent with the purpose of interest of the Government to strengthen the British stations at Gibraltar and Malta. Such questions, he further said, might provoke mischief. The Government was alive to the important duty of maintaining British defences.

IT'S A NEW CABINET. ROYAL, Dec. 5.—It is definitely announced this evening that a new Cabinet has been constituted as follows: President of the Council and Minister of the Interior, Giuseppe Zanardelli; Minister of the Treasury and of an interim Minister of Finance, Pietro Barilli; Minister of Public Works, Alessandro Foras; Minister of War, Gen. San Marzano; Minister of Agriculture, Commerce and Public Works, Nicola Gallo; Minister of Marine, Rear Admiral Carlo Alberto Rocchia.

MARQUIS DE RAYS REPORTED DEAD. LONDON, Dec. 5.—A despatch to a news agency from Paris says that the Marquis de Rays is dead. The announcement of his death appears in the Paris Temps, but no news is given, nor is the time or place of his death.

THE DESTINATION BEING A SECRET. It is reported that the crews will not be allowed to communicate with the shore, and that when they further news is received the Peizoto's two cruizers will be forwarded to the United States.

UNDECEDED INCOME TAX. No Financial Legislation Expected Until the Tariff is Disposed Of.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The meeting of the Finance Committee today indicates that it will probably be some time before legislation at this session of Congress, at least until after the tariff has been disposed of.

SMALL BUT SURE ANTIDOTE. ALBANY, Dec. 5.—Yerkes, the mail train between Zenith and Renier was killed by 12 Arabs. One passenger was killed and the train was wrecked. The Arabs were seen to be carrying a large quantity of dynamite.

CREDIT MOBILIER TO REORGANIZE. ROYAL, Dec. 5.—It is stated that the Credit Mobilier has received foreign offers to purchase a large amount of the shares of the company, and that the company is being reorganized.

DELIMITING AFRICAN BOUNDARIES. BERLIN, Dec. 5.—The Franco-German conference at Berlin is today discussing the delimitation of the boundaries of the Congo basin. The French and German delegates are in disagreement over the boundaries of the basin.

FIVE DROWNED FROM A FISHING BOAT. BERLIN, Dec. 5.—A fishing boat was capsized in the Frisch-Haff. Eight Prussians, today and five persons were drowned.

BITTON NOT A TRANSMIGRATOR. CHRYSLER, Dec. 5.—The morning Thomas Bitton of Toronto was before the police magistrate on a charge of violating "The Transient Traders' By-law. After evidence and argument the case against Bitton was dismissed and he was discharged. It was shown that the bylaw was not applicable to the circumstances of Bitton's sale.

TO SUPPRESS ILLEGAL RECOUPMENT. BERLIN, Dec. 5.—A royal decree has been issued appointing a commission to inquire into the abuses connected with the couponing of railway tickets, and to how far financial speculative character.

HEROISM BRINGS IT AN OWN REWARD. DERRINGTON, Dec. 5.—A Washington despatch says that Capt. Clarke of the Canadian tug Reliance will receive a gold watch and chain from the Government of the Dominion of Wales for his heroism in rescuing the crew of the American tug Acme in the Georgian Bay.

THE LEHIGH STRIKE OFF.

Three Engines Wrecked in a Collision at Warrior Run.

It is now said that President Wilbur will agree to his ultimatum of a week ago, pledging himself to deal with his old employees as individuals the strike will be declared off.
