## News-Record

THE C. P. R. AND THE CONSERVATIVES.

Premier Macdonald will not build any railways under the government ownership plan this year owing to the poor wheat crop outlook. Rain has fallen there during the past week, but it came too late to ensure even an average yield for the greater part of that province. Hence Hugh John considers it wise to wait until another season before undertaking any great provincial work of that character.

As might have been expected the C. P. R. views that province's proposal to build and own its own railways with much disfavor and it is reported that the C.P.R. has threatened the Conservatives in the Dominion with extermination if Hugh John dares go in for government ownership and construction of railways.

Government ownership of railways and all other national and provincial franchises is the right principle and the coming thing, and when the people once see the gain there will be in it for themselves they will not hesitate to take those franchises over. When the country is ready to do this, it will meet with strenuous opposition from corporations like the C.P.R. but they will have to be fought and made to fall into line.

The C.P.R. affords an instance of where the creature power created by the Dominion government was exceedingly liberal to that corporation. Too liberal if anything. It received hundreds of millions of dollars from the Canadian people to aid it in building the great national line—some claim that the country practically paid for the whole road as it stood when completed and then presented it to Van Horne & Co. At any rate they received many million dollars of money and huge grants of land, worth millions more and upon a great part of which, even after holding it for twenty years, they refused to pay taxes. The big corporation in question has been too well used.

The C. P. R. is now using the power given it by the people, through the government, to corner all the benefits it can lay its hands on. It is a notorious fact that the C. P. Hugh John Macdonald appealed to the people of Manitoba on the grounds that he would oppose that grasping corporation to the last ditch and attempt to relieve the people from its power and greed. The people there endorsed him and Macdonald was elected in spite of the C. P. R.'s money and its influence. Sir Charles Tupper should take up the C. P. R.'s challenge and carry the question to the people. If he does so, we are not afraid of the outcome. That railway ring at Ottawa needs a lesson and needs it badly. It has altogether too much to say in the affairs of Canada for the country's good and it is time its rule was ended.

**LIBERALS AFRAID OF JUDGES**  
Won't Have Judicial Enquiry Into Yukon Affairs.  
Mr. Bell Moves That a Commission Be Appointed to Investigate Charge—Ex-Minister Foster Says Their Report Would Attest the Government as Two Topics, Omaha and Victoria—Charles Tupper Says Tarnish.

Ottawa, June 29.—Before the House met yesterday morning, all the Conservative members gathered in Room 6 to say good-bye to Sir Charles Tupper, who sailed for England on the Allan Line today. Brief speeches were made, to which Sir Charles replied, and after a cheer and good wishes Sir Charles left for the Montreal train. He expects to be absent for about six weeks. When he returns he will go on a vigorous campaign throughout the Dominion.

## The Report of the 101st Five.

When the House assembled yesterday morning Mr. S. A. H. Foster presented the report of the committee appointed to investigate the emergency food charges made by Mr. John Macdonald.

In answer to some inquiries the Prime Minister said he considered the best way to celebrate Dominion Day was by good hard work.

**Railway Subsidies Next Tuesday.**  
Hon. Mr. Fielding informed Mr. Foster that he had been told there were no other supplementary estimates, but that the railway subsidies would be brought down next Tuesday. These subsidies are said to total \$20,000,000.

W. H. Bennett arose to explain what he had said about Equal Rights for Stubbins. He said that he had declared in his speech at Cardwell that Stubbins frequented the caucus of the Liberal party, and that the party had no more partisan follower than Stubbins.

Stubbins said: "I thank the gentleman for his apologies." (Laughter.)  
**Yukon Charges.**  
The rest of the morning the whole of the afternoon and most of the evening were spent in the discussion of Yukon charges advanced by Mr. John Macdonald.

Mr. Sutherland replied, and declared Sir Hilbert had left the Yukon late to Mr. Bell because he was ashamed to face the House and the country for it.

The whole of the charges were a most disgraceful document, tending to discredit Canada in the eyes of the world. Dr. Catto, whom he did not know, he characterized as a person partly lunatic, and as a vicious and immoral character in whom no credence was to be placed.

**Then a Fight Followed.**  
He desired to read a letter from Major Bell, explaining his relation to the opening of Dominion Creek, when Mr. Foster raised a point of order that the letter written to the House should be read.

Mr. Davin replied that this challenge was ridiculous at such a late hour in the session.  
Mr. Belcourt termed the charges foul, dirty and infamous. Then he told what he knew of one of the charges, having acted as solicitor of an interested party.

After Col. Denville had spoken in vain, against the resolution, and Hon. Mr. Patterson had read the Chamber with his thunder, Mr. Foster summed up the situation, and argued for a commission to go up to the Yukon and investigate the charges of corruption there.

"Put on your investigation by judges, if you dare, and I am prepared to meet their report will astonish you on two topics, namely, gambling and vice."  
Sir Louis Davies followed and termed the charges infernal lies.

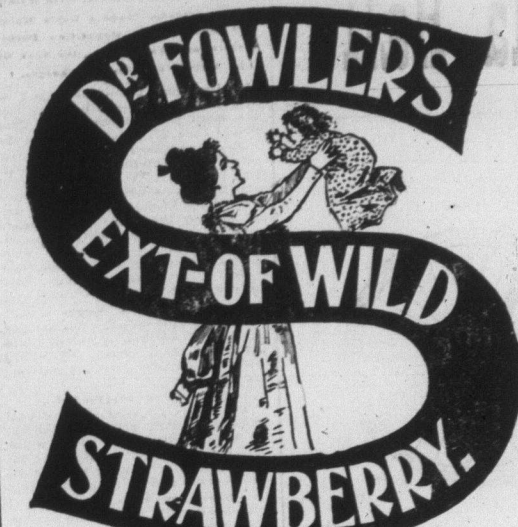

Mr. Forster, said that in the early 50's the Province of Canada loaned the sum of \$2,111,500 to the G. T. R. In 1858 the repayment of the loan was postponed till the preference stock had been paid, later, Mr. Scott said, permission had been given to issue bonds.

**SOME SEVERE FIGHTING.**  
Col. Carter's Force Was Ambushed, But the Bayonet Was Resorted To.  
Cape Coast Castle, June 28.—Col. Carter left Kwaana on the morning of June 26 with the intention of reinforcing Captain Hall at Bekwai, with 400 men, 200 carriers, a seven pounder and a Maxim.
