genius, and uniting it with an energy and eloquence which his father did not possess. His mother, in her pride, predicted that "Ben would some day be Lord Chancellor or Prime Minister."

While still a minor, he wrote the novel of "Vivian Grey," which was published anonymously in 1826, and created no small sensation.

After several unsuccessful contests, Mr. Disraeli was at length returned to Parliament for Maidstone in 1837. His maiden speech is memorable for its unfavorable reception, and his prediction that "the time would come when the House would hear him,"-a prophecy which was very soon fulfilled.

In 1844, was published the most successful of Mr. Disraeli's writings-"Coningsby, or the New Generation," which ran through five large editions in as many years. It is the expression of the author's dissatisfaction with the policy and aims of the Conservative party, which came into power in 1841 under the leadership of Sir Robert Peel. In 1845, appeared "Sibyl, or the Two Nations," and "Tancred" was published two years later.

The death of Lord George Bentinck, in 1848, led to Mr. Disraeli becoming chief of the Opposition in the House of Commons. When his party came into power, in 1852, he was appointed Chancellor of the Exchequer, which office he held at intervals until the retirement of Lord Derby, in 1868, raised him to the Premiership.

Born in 1805, Mr. Disraeli is now nearly sixty-five years of age, and still in full possession of the high parliamentary qualities which he displayed in his youth; while the last production of his pen, "Lothair," shows that his genius has lost none of the brilliancy of early days.
