This is the somewhat grotesque title of one of the best women who ever wore a crown. In our hatred of England and England's policy of extermination in Ireland we must not blind ourselves to the noble character and lofty motives of the woman who for sixty years has reigned, if she did not rule, over England. To justly estimate her worth we must not compare her with an ideal queen or judge herby the abstract laws of responsible Christian monarchy; we must consider her in the light good woman. No scandal ever invaded the precincts of her court. or one who was divorced and married again. Her family were brought up under as strict discipline as any in England, and while under her eye were models of princely conduct. She has fixed as next to princes of the blood royal and before that of the Archbishop of Canterbury.
