This program has been in effect since 1984 and we currently have 867 spouses on our mailing list. In addition to our bi-monthly publication *Liaison*, participants receive, approximately every six weeks, information of relevance to foreign service life such as the schedules of workshops for spouses, pre-posting workshops, notices of English and French language training at Headquarters, announcements of contract possibilities, and Departmental documents which are of particular interest to, or which concern, foreign service spouses and families.

Liaison first appeared in April of 1984.
