Question No. 3,188-Mr. Lambert:

1. What is the strength and location of all naval, air force and ground personnel in (a) Manitoba (b) Saskatchewan (c) Alberta (d) British Columbia (e) the Yukon (f) the Northwest Territories?

2. What are the names of all active armed forces bases in western Canada and the Territories and which bases were deactivated in the past two years?

3. What is the over-all ratio of male to female personnel in western Canada and the Territories?

Mrs. Ursula Appolloni (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of National Defence): 1 and 2 Canadian Forces bases are no longer exclusively manned by personnel identified to one element or another. In providing the data in the table it is to be noted that maritime, land or air elements are predominating rather than exclusive on the bases so annotated. Where a single element cannot be exclusively identified, it is because of its tri-service orientation.

The only base deactivated in the past two years is CFS Churchill, Manitoba.

DND RESEARCH INTO RADIATION HAZARD

Question No. 3,273-Mr. McKinnon:

1. Did the Department of National Defence award a contract for a study on radiation-induced nausea and vomiting using rats and dogs and, if so, to whom?

2. Was the government asked to conduct these experiments in support of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and, if not, who decided on the need for such a study?

3. Did the department check with its NATO allies to see if such experiments had been performed elsewhere and, if so, what were its findings?

4. Will the experiments be performed in co-operation with any other country and, if so, which country?

5. During the experiments, how long will an irradiated animal be kept alive?

Mrs. Ursula Appolloni (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of National Defence): 1. The Department of Supply and Services on behalf of the Department of National Defence awarded a contract to study radiation induced nausea and vomiting using dogs to the University of Ottawa.

2. No. The department considered these experiments to be necessary as part of its study on the biological effects of ionizing radiation from nuclear weapons.

3. NATO allies have been consulted and following a world search of literature, it was determined that this work has not been done before.

PURCHASE OF AIRCRAFT REFUELLER TRUCKS

Mrs. Ursula Appolloni (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of National Defence): Yes, DND contracted through DSS with Remtec Inc. for 157 aircraft refueller trucks plus spare parts and operating and maintenance manuals. The vehicles will be positioned at 19 Canadian Forces Bases across Canada and in support of Canadian forces overseas.
