## Oral Questions

The policies have been well stated, by myself and the Deputy, and they are in our public information. They are that we will not enter into assistance for competitive industries.

The New Democratic Party may want to pick winners and losers in competitive industries. The business men and women of Canada do not believe that the Government picking winners and losers in competitive industries is the best use of taxpayers' dollars, and I do not believe the taxpayers of Canada do either.

## POSITION OF MINISTERS

Hon. Edward Broadbent (Oshawa): Mr. Speaker, would the Minister explain why the Deputy Minister in charge of Western Diversification said yesterday, with reference to one particular sector, that there could be no development programs in that sector any more? The Deputy Minister of Finance actually read the deal and was talking about the negotiations that will go on for the next five to seven years and about what will no doubt constitute a subsidy. Why is it that these experts have one position and cabinet Ministers, who are trying to save their political hides, have another?

Hon. Bill McKnight (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development and Minister of Western Economic Diversification): Mr. Speaker, I do not think Ministers or Members on this side have to worry about their political hides when people look at the alternatives that are being put forward.

I have already explained to the Hon. Member why Western Economic Diversification has been saying since it was formed that we will not be assisting competitive industries. We do not believe, and neither do people in the industry—and he can check with the red meat industry in western Canada—that

Governments should pick winners and losers in a competitive industry. When I said no, there is no need to change because of the free trade agreement, that is accurate.

The free trade agreement does not pose any obligations concerning subsidies that are not already there under the GATT. If we could assist, promote, and not have fear of countervail under GATT, then we can continue to assist, promote, and have no fear of countervail under free trade.
