In view of the present indications of an impending strike among railway employees in Canada—a contingency involving consequences too disastrous and deplorable to be thought of without concern and alarm—the author hopes that this pamphlet, if it can be brought to the attention of the railway men, will have some weight in deciding them against so unwise a course. You will note that I deal with the disastrous Chicago strike of 1894 and the Stratford strike, both of which have their lessons for the men of to-day.
