CHEMULPO WINS LAST AT CONNAUGHT PARK

Love Day, Heavily Played Favorite, Outside the Money—Another Win for Zodiac.

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.—Form players got some of their own back in today's races at Connaught Park when no fewer than five favorites finished home in front. The victory of Baron De Kalb at 15 to 1 was the chief surprise. The track was fast and another great crowd turned out under beautiful weather conditions. Ladies' day bringing out the usual representation of the fair sex. Brynlimah, the most popular choice, captured the first race in which a lot of wise money went wrong on Syosset. Starion Gately, the second best, beat Meissen, the favorite in the next, while in the third the big share of the purse went to Baron De Kalb, at 15 to 1. Tankard, favorite, finished second. Zodiac scored his third win of the meeting in the 5 1/2 furlong dash for juveniles, and Myrtle Marston lived up to expectations in the fifth, beating a fast field, which included Springman and Question Mark. Anavri rewarded her backers in the sixth, and Tolson 4 Or was second with The Rump third. The East—Pur saw the defeat of the heavily played Love Day, Chemulpo winning with Pierre Dumas, an outsider, second. Pierre Dumas set the pace, and it was not until they were, but a furlong from the tape that Chemulpo came on. Fairy Godmother, with a heap of place and show money behind her, was left at the post.
