LIST OF WINNERS AT HORSE SHOW

Excellent and Exciting Contests Were Seen on First Night.

MISS LONG NOT THERE

Famous Cob Imitation Was Not Shown in His Class.

The first day at the Canadian National Horse Show brought forward some excellent contests. In the first event, Class 76, for Clydesdales, the Dominion Transport Company carried off the first three prizes.

Sunnybrook Farm was successful in winning two firsts, one second, two thirds and two reserve prizes.

In the Class 27 event, for qualified hunters, some excellent jumping was shown. The winner of the event being Eglington, owned by Sunnybrook Farm.

Some disappointment was felt when it was found that Miss Louisa Long of Kansas City was not showing her imitation as Class 60, Miss Long is said to have the second best stable in the United States, and quite a number of people were looking forward to seeing her first exhibit.

Some very indifferent jumping was shown by N.C.O. and men in Class 55. Fully fifty per cent. of the horses refused to take the first jump, and but a very few cleared the jumps without fault.

BUSINESS SHOW IS PROVING POPULAR

Excellent List of Attractions Planned For This Afternoon and Evening—Exhibit Closes Tonight.

To-day is the last day of the Toronto Business Show. It will be open from two o'clock this afternoon until ten-thirty this evening. It has been in point of attendance, diversity and comprehensiveness of exhibits, etc., in fact in every point, and in every way, the greatest Business Show ever held in Canada.

Evidence of business depression has been conspicuous by reason of its absence. Throughout the week that the Show has been running a large number of business men have attended and sales have been brisk. Exhibitors, who measure the success of a show by the volume of sales and prospects, state that the show of this year totally eclipses the initial event of last year.

Last night 6,000 people thronged the aisles of the Arena. The large hall at the southern end of the building was packed for the moving picture show and the seats around the orchestra stand were occupied by a crowd of auditors throughout the musical concert.

Practically every up-to-date office appliance, fixture and device calculated to make for increased efficiency, economy and facility in the discharge of office work is on display as are also office furniture and appointments of all kinds.

The show will be open this afternoon and evening for the last time this year. Numerous attractions, including moving pictures, a lecture on business ethics and orchestral music have been arranged.
