

Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris seconded the vote, pointing out that the speaker had proven himself thoroughly qualified as a fish inspector, and that his report in extended form would prove of very great value. The moral, he said, to be learned from the lecture is: "We can, by united effort, clear of party politics, bring the herring fishery up to the level of the codfishery." The Fishery Commission had been agreed to at last session by both sides of the House, and Mr. Duff had come in response to the request made by him during his recent visit

to London. As a result of the report to be prepared by Mr. Duff, he hoped capital would be so stimulated that the suggestions made in the address might be quickly realized.

Mr. A. McDougall thought the time had come when we should seize the situation with both hands. The advice given by Mr. Duff should be followed up, and, speaking from experience as one connected with the fisheries, he felt it would result in vast benefit to both fishermen and merchants and make our men the best vaild of their class in the world.
