DIGGING WORMS FOR BAIT FOR WINTER

Among the various winter occupations carried on along English shores there is, at the quaint little town of Yarmouth, a business at least one industry which is rare of an unusual nature, and which provides employment for a class known as "worm diggers." This industry is known as "worm diggering," and during the winter months some thirty men engaged in the work. These men go down at low tide into the sea, and dig up worms which are known as "the East Angles," and which are used for bait on each of the various fishing boats or similar appliances, and there also for the sandworms which are used as bait on modest artificial baits. An experienced hand can dig up about a thousand worms at a "tide," and the number of worms at low tide, but even this number is frequently exceeded. The worms are sent by rail in wooden boxes to Yarmouth, Lowestoft and similar places, 100,000 a week being the average quantity. The number of worms so despatched. USE OF CIGARET GROWS IN GERMANY

Consumption Is Rapidly Increasing and High Figures Are Being Attained.

The consumption of cigarets is rapidly increasing in Germany. In 1937 approximately 1,100,000,000 cigarets were manufactured in that country, while the present production is about nine times as large. Cigaret cartidges and papers used by smokers

The tremendous increase in output appears to be due to rapidly increasing consumption of cheap cigarettes.

It is estimated that German smokers spend about \$60,000,000 annually on cigarettes and that some 20,000,000 Germans smoke an average of 550 cigarettes a year.

About one-fifth as many cigarettes are exported as are imported. Exports go chiefly to Holland, Denmark, Norway and Switzerland.

DEATH RATE IN FRANCE DECLINES

anges in the population of France during the first six months of 1919. The most notable item is the excess births over deaths; for these six months this excess amounted to 14,2, whereas in the corresponding half 1911 deaths outnumbered births by 270—this is not due to any

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On the contrary, the number of births reported declined from 385,999 during the first six months of 1911 to 375,747 for the corresponding period of the present year.

There was a decrease, from 404,278 in 1911 (six months) to 364,635 in January-June, 1912. There was thus a falling off of 7192 births to be set against a decrease of 39,643 deaths. The number of deaths in 1912 is 14,000 less than in the corresponding period of 1911.

This continued diminution of the deaths reflects credit on the steadily improving sanitary and disinfection methods which are being gradually brought into general practice throughout France.
