REFERENDUM IN QUEBEC

PROBABLY ON APRIL 10

Quebec, March 19.—At a meeting of the provincial cabinet held last night the date was fixed for the holding of the referendum on the question of beer and light wines in the province of Quebec, which the law now dictates must be held between the first and fifteenth of April next.

No official announcement of the date has yet been made as the order-in-council proclaiming it will only be signed by the lieutenant-governor today, but it is generally understood that the date set for the voting is Thursday, April 10.

FORTY THOUSAND WELCOME "PATS"

Welcoming Reception in Canada's Capital—Soldiers on March Inspiring Spectacle.

Ottawa, March 19.—Forty thousand enthusiastic citizens today gave royal welcome to the Princess Patricia, Canada's most spectacular fighting unit. Practically all business was suspended and the route of march from the Central Station to the Exhibition grounds, more than two miles away, was lined with a cheering crowd. The men were in full fighting dress, steel helmets and rifles and made an inspiring spectacle as they silently marched thru the throngs. After a short march the regiment formed on Connaught Square where a dais had been erected and where his excellency the governor-general gave warm welcome to the returned heroes. The honored colors presented to the battalion by the former Princess Patricia were carried proudly aloft.

In his report, the grand secretary, F. M. Clark of Belleville, pointed out that in the period of reconstruction in Canada the Orange Order had a large part to play. Freedom had been purchased at a heavy price, he said, and he urged that eternal vigilance would remain the price of freedom. The percentage of enlistments according to nationality in each province was given as follows: British Columbia, 12.3; Manitoba, 13.9; Ontario, 14.8; Quebec, 1.3; Saskatchewan, 4.8; New Brunswick, 6.4; Ontario, 9.7; Quebec, 1.3.

The statistical report of Mr. Clark was one of the best in the history of the order.

W. J. McPherson, general organizer of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railroad Employees, who is at present in Toronto, will hold a meeting at Victoria Hall, East Queen street, Friday evening, March 21, 1919. The meeting is expected to be largely attended by the clerks, freight handlers, storemen and station employees of the Canadian National Railways, as the proposed schedule now in negotiation between the Canadian Brotherhood of Railroad Employees and the Canadian National Railways, affecting eastern lines, will be ready, the western lines schedule having already been completed.

ROYAL KNIGHTS CONCLUDE SESSION

Annual Meeting Eastern Ontario Protests Sinn Fein Movement in Canada.

URGE PROHIBITION

Go on Record as Favoring Permanent Policy Along This Line.

Cornwall, Ont., March 19.—The concluding session of the 43rd annual meeting of the grand chapter of the Royal Knights of Ireland was held here today. The resolution committee submitted a number of resolutions and all were carried unanimously, the substance of the resolutions being as follows: That we protest against the Sinn Fein movement in Canada, and record our disapproval of the assertions made in some old country newspapers that Canada is in favor of that movement and we ask the Canadian government to do all in its power to prevent the spread of the movement here thru literature or public meetings and to severely punish those guilty of circulating that propaganda.

That the government be urged to prohibit the teaching of the German language in the public schools for a period of at least fifty years as a penalty for that nation planning and carrying out the cruel war.

That we ask for the doing away of all sectarian and foreign schools so as to nationalize all schools throughout the country and that all assessable property be taxed.

Urges Prohibition. That we demand the disfranchisement of all aliens and citizens who refuse to recognize British citizenship, that all undesirable and suspicious characters shall be deported to the place from which they came.

That we urge the government to stand by the war time prohibition measure looking to a permanent policy along these lines. Ontario west has already taken action on this matter and we place ourselves in line with that policy.

That we demand the immediate settlement of the marriage laws of the Dominion once and for all, and that all canon laws foreign to this Dominion shall be prohibited.

That, in view of the revelations made in connection with the Sister Mary Basil case and the Good Shepherd Home, we demand a strict government inspection of all convents, schools, children's orphanages, foundling hospitals and similar institutions.

JAP AGENTS STIR UP HOSTILITY TO U. S.

Washington, March 19.—Much of the hostility in Vladivostok toward Americans is attributed in well informed circles here to the activity of Japanese agents. It has been reported that about three weeks ago a Japanese publicity agent arrived in Vladivostok.

Within a few days, these reports say, articles began appearing in newspapers of Vladivostok, which are said to be under Japanese influence, reflecting upon the United States and its Siberian policy, or as the articles declared, its lack of policy.

State department officials said today that the situation as regards Japanese influence was clearing. The war party in Japan to which much of the friction was attributed in reports reaching this country, has been superseded by the peace party.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

Montreal.—Rev. Father Rene LaBelle, parish priest of Notre Dame, Montreal, was chosen as superior-general of the Sulpician Order in Canada, succeeded Rev. Father Troie, who died last Saturday.

Edmonton.—The people of Alberta during the war contributed the total of \$42,000,000 toward financial aid in the war effort of the Dominion, according to an announcement made in the legislature yesterday afternoon.
