Head Line Year's Review. Compared with the tally of the winning team of 1903, 515 points scored by the 4th, again gives evidence of the raised standard of marksmanship at the meet just concluded. That the Grenadiers' strength was not passed in their first team, the showing of the second, 546 points, with third place secured, makes evident.

The make-up of the winning of the Grenadier team were: Assistant Orderly Room Sergeant Simpson, 100; Sgt. Instructor Mortimer, 83; Corporal Phillips, 82; Armory Sgt. Bayles, 81; Quartermaster Sergeant Craig, 80; Pte. Tyers, 80; total, 553.
