Montreal, Live Stock.

Montreal, Aug. 8.—There were about 375 head of butchers' cattle, 60 calves and 305 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the East End abattorir to-day. The butchers were present in large numbers, and trade was good, with prices decidedly higher all round owing to the unsually small supplies.
