Dr. Gould of Philadelphia entered a plea for a reciprocity of good feeling and kindliness between the United States and Canada. Adverting to the objects of the Canadian Medical Association, he said one of these was to stop the practice of illegal medicine, which had such a hold in the rural districts. He bespoke co-operation in educating the farmers to stop supporting quackery and to appreciate the benefits of preventive medicine. For every dollar invested in the latter there would be a return of 50 per cent. He knew of nothing that could show better results. There was no reason why the death rate should not be greatly reduced. It would be if the knowledge they possessed were put in practice. In this connection the doctor spoke of the importance of bacterlological examinations and the necessity of a pure milk supply.
