

Drinking Water System,

Another engine works the drinking water system. Every flat has its founts; the city water is filtered and discharged into a tank, where it is cooled by refrigerator coils. Then it is forced to the founts, and the water thrown away is returned to be refilthrown away is returned to be refliered and recooled, so that there is a constant circulation maintained. Close at hand is the city letter-box, which connects with the automatic mail chute, which works for all the floors. Still another machine manages the connects with the automatic litaric chute, which works for all the floors. Still another machine manages the elevators. These electric elevators, by the way, are the lightest running in the city. Their load can be started by from 35 to 40 amperes, while the others require 125 amperes and upwards. The apparatus provides an automatic opening and closing of the elevator doors on the elevator man pressing a lever in the floor with his foot. The doors can be opened only when the cage is in the proper place; and so accidents thru persons falling down the elevator shaft will be prevented. Two big pumps feed the boilers with water already heated to 212 degrees. The heating is performed on the nopressure system, exhaust steam being used from the engine. A Paul pump takes the air from the heating system and relieves the back pressure of the engines. Hot water is supplied to all parts of the building on the Toby system.
