

BIG DUCAL HOUSE  
SPLITS ON LORDSThe Carlisle Girls for Reform,  
But Sons Stand by the  
Peers.

London, May 7.—At the recent parliamentary election in the Hexham division of Northumberland the piquant spectacle was witnessed of the members of a peer's family taking opposite sides in a red hot political fight. Ladies Dorothy and Aurelia Howard, daughters of the Earl of Carlisle, did their best for the Liberal candidate, while their brother, Lord Morpeth, the heir to the earldom, energetically supported the Conservative candidate.

It was merely a flesh illustration of the divisions in the noble houses of Carlisle which give it a unique claim to distinction among aristocratic English families, whose members usually follow their leaders as blindly as flocks of sheep.

On political and social questions the family is hopelessly at odds. Unbridgeable controversial chasms separate them. The Earl is a conservative of the old fashioned type. A notable member of the house of lords, he regards it with veneration as the chief pillar of the constitution. He believes in the superiority of blue blood, caste distinction, and all the rest of the aristocratic creed. He is opposed to woman suffrage and every other phase of the woman's rights movement.

The countess who can boast a pedigree quite the equal of her husband's, by some strange reversal of the law of heredity, is a rampant radical. With her the claims for long descent count for nothing. She sides with the people against the peers. She openly advocates the abolition of the House of Lords if it refuses to yield to the popular will. She is an ardent advocate of the equality of the sexes. She is a regular Susan B. Anthony sort of woman and gifted with quite a notable flow of oratory as was that indomitable champion of the suffrage movement in America.

**Family a Paradox.**  
The children, of whom there are eight surviving, exhibit the same diversity of opinions combined with the courage of their convictions. As a general thing the men hold the views of their father, and the women those of their mother. But perhaps the most striking thing about them is that they never quarrel. They represent a paradox. Theirs is a house divided against itself, and yet it still stands and flourishes. They are a disunited family, and yet they live together in sweetest unity. They afford a liberal education to their friends, for at their home one is sure to hear both sides of any question that comes up for discussion.

When they espouse opposite sides in public it is the side on which the women are found that generally wins. That was the case at the recent election. The Liberal candidate was elected by a large majority. One of the issues was the House of Lords. Lord Morpeth made several speeches in favor of maintaining unrestricted the legislative powers of the peers. And his sister, Lady Dorothy Howard, who has inherited her mother's gift of speech, as often demolished them, demonstrating to the huge satisfaction of her audience that an unfettered House of Lords constituted the greatest obstacle to legislative progress in the kingdom. But that did not disturb in the least the friendly feeling between the brother and the sister.

At one of the meetings addressed by Lord Morpeth, Lady Dorothy distributed leaflets advocating Liberal principles among the people for whose benefit her brother was engaged in promoting Conservative doctrines.

She Could Win the Men.  
While canvassing they frequently ran across each other, and such meetings led to a lively exchange of banter. "I say, Dorothy," exclaimed Lord Morpeth on one occasion, "it is no use your going in there"—indicating a house which he had just left—"I have secured that little lot."

"I suppose you mean that you have kissed all the babies in the family," was the retort. "At that game I admit that I am no match for you, but I can beat you all hollow when it comes to talking over the men. When I leave that house I shall have captured that 'little lot' of yours for the other side."

Lady Dorothy Howard carried off high honors at Girton College, a feminine institution of learning which is supposed to be remarkably successful in transforming charming young women into unattractive blue stockings. But there is nothing suggestive of that type about Lady Dorothy. She is persuasive without being aggressive. Her general appearance and demure demeanor are those of a twentieth century Puritan maiden. Even when she straggled through London in the memorable march of the women suffragists, carrying a banner, she still contrived to look gentle and womanly. Her enthusiasm for the causes she advocates is tempered by that saving grace of humor which is so conspicuously absent in most women reformers. It is said that she can argue in seven languages.

**ROGERS PLEADS INNOCENCE.**  
Middleton, N. Y., May 13.—Charles H. Rogers, who was arrested in Los Angeles after a year-long chase on a charge of having murdered the O'Connell brothers and Alice Ingerick, near here in October, 1905, today was arraigned in the supreme court and pleaded not guilty. He was remanded without bail for trial in October. The officers who brought Rogers from Los Angeles say that he made a complete confession.

**THE CONGREGATIONALISTS.**  
Hamilton, May 12.—The Congregational Union of Canada will meet in its city June 5 to 10, when more than thirty interesting sessions are expected. Among the matters which will add to the interest are the reorganization of the union on a Dominion basis, and the completion of the union with the United Brethren conference.

THE SIOUX TRIBE  
MUCH EXCITEDGreat Chief Red Cloud, Ruler  
Forty Years, Is Near  
Death.

Indian Agency, South Dakota, May 13.—Twenty thousand Indian warriors, backed by all the squaws and paposes of the great Sioux tribe, are keyed to a tip-toe of excitement over the anticipated early death of the aged chief, Red Cloud, and the election and selection of a successor to the sachem who has ruled over all the different bands of the Sioux Nation for more than forty years. For many "moons" Mahe-luta Red Cloud has been near death, and has fought the fight of a brave Indian with the "Death Spirit," but the old man has now given in, and realizes that his time has come to die. In preparation for his early death, two weeks ago Red Cloud dictated a letter to Buffalo Bill, his white friend, asking him to be good to his people after he himself was dead. After finishing his dictation, Red Cloud announced to his family and friends that he was near to the entrance to the Happy Hunting Grounds, and that he was ready and anxious to take the trail which leads thereto. And the Indians are as much worked up over the election of a new chief as they are over the approaching death of their present ruler.

Red Cloud won the chieftainship of the Sioux tribe 40 years ago by sheer ability, and by his hostility to the whites, his fighting qualities, generalship, bravery, and diplomacy.

Red Cloud's great rival was Sitting Bull. And today the rivalry which existed between those two redoubtable warriors is being repeated in their children. Jack Red Cloud, son of Mahe-luta, wants to succeed his father as head chief, and One Bull, son of the famous Sitting Bull, also wants the position.

American Horse is known in war, and is known in council. His fame in either is only slightly below that of Red Cloud. He is a friend of the whites, and at the same time is a friend of the reds. Last fall, when the runaway Ute Indians were corralled in Northern Wyoming, they demanded that American Horse be sent for to represent them in the "pow-wow" which was to be held. As a result, that council, where the Government was represented by some of its most able army officers, old American Horse so manipulated things that by his diplomacy the Utes received even more than they asked for, the army officers being thoroughly out-generated.

## FRANCE AND THE UNIONS

Government Will Not Permit Officials or Teachers to Organize.

Paris, May 13.—When the Chamber of Deputies reassembled today, Education Minister Briand replied to further interpellations of the Government on the latter's policy towards labor.

He declared that the ministers had acted in the true interests of both the republic and the working people, suppressing the violence and tyranny of the revolutionary general confederation of labor, and expressed his determination, with the fullest approval of his colleagues, not to permit any attempt at insubordination on the part of the school teachers or other state officials.

Continuing, M. Briand said the Government categorically refused to authorize the school teachers and other state officials to form the unions which

the general federation of labor desired in order to provoke confusion and disorder, the officials appearing to the country to be over the heads of the cabinet ministers.

The Government desired to overcome anarchy by means of order and discipline, thus avoiding certain reaction. If the Chamber did not support the Government's disciplinary measures, the ministers would not retain their portfolios.

The debate was adjourned until tomorrow, when the Government will ask for a vote of confidence.
