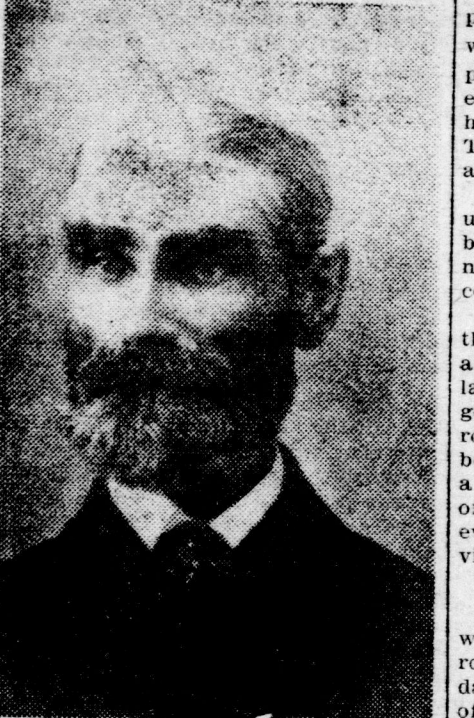
WORKED FOR FIRM 63 YEARS AGO

of three persons—John Blair, who was the president—they didn't have a mayor in those days, James Reid, familiarly known as 'Cooper' Reid, and a man named Cruickshanks, who owned the ground where the Masonic Temple now stands, and who was also a cooper.

"When the firm first started they made all sorts of ordinary tinware then in use, but later a man named Reese came to work at the shop, and he began to make copper kettles and the like.

Molding Shop Begun.
"Later, the firm started into the manufacture of agricultural implements, and it became necessary to in-

stal a molding plant to mold the plow-boards. This was the beginning of the present gigantic molding shop, which covers so much ground, for when the McClarys quit the making of agricultural implements they went extensively into the manufacture of stoves.

"I remember John McClary's father very well. John was a big man, but his father was much bigger than he. The old gentleman was in the habit of coming around the shop, and we often talked with him."

A Remarkable Man.
Mr. Gibson is a remarkable man for his age. His hearing is not as acute as it used to be, but his appearance is that of a man of 65, while his memory is something remarkable.

Though 83 years of age, he continues in the employ of the McClary Manufacturing Company, and to the Advertiser Mr. Gibson paid a tribute to the McClarys.

"They were always good people to work for," he said, "I know them for going on 70 years, and I have worked for them over 50 years. I always found them honorable with their men, young and old. They deserve the success they have achieved, for John and Oliver McClary were hard-working, hard-headed, progressive businessmen all their lives."

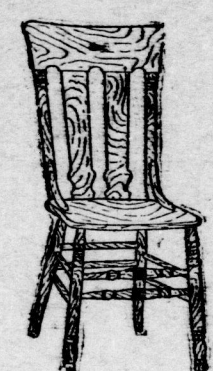

EMPLOYEES PRESENT A GOLD HEADED CANE TO MR. McCLARY

Pleasant Affair at the Big
"At Home" Held
Last Night.

The largest and most successful social event which has ever taken place in this city was conducted last night at the new warehouse building of the McClary Manufacturing Company's plant in the southeast end of the city, where over 1,800 employees of the company, with their friends, gathered to enjoy an "at home," the like of which has never been held in this city before. The event was connected with the 60th anniversary celebration of the firm.

Eight o'clock was the time scheduled for the dance to begin, but long before that time the vast floor of the new building on which the dance was conducted was thronged with people. The guests entered the building on the ground floor by the main entrance, and immediately inside were erected large checkrooms for both ladies and gentlemen to store their wraps. A long line of ladies' wraps, and a long line of gentlemen's wraps, had been fitted up to serve the purpose of a smoking-room for the men. This part of the building was decorated with evergreens, flags, etc., and gave the visitors a very cosy welcome.

A Beautiful Sight.
Several temporary winding stairways had been erected from the lower room to the main floor, where the dance was conducted. Once at the top of the stair, the sight which met the eyes of the guests was most imposing. There before them lay a vast hall, larger than any ever used for a social function before in this city, beautifully decorated with evergreens, maple leaves, flags, bunting, and patriotic designs, while from the ceiling were suspended at regular intervals great arc lights, the brilliant glare of which illuminated the whole scene with the brightness of day.

Held a Levee.
The great floor of the hall which measured 231 by 100 feet was almost completely taken up by the vast crowd of guests. At one end of the hall was erected a platform, over which was arranged a bower of maples. Seated on this platform and surrounded by many of the oldest employees of his firm was Mr. John McClary, the founder of the firm, and also many old men who are now ex-employees of McClary, but who spent the greater part of their lives in the service of the firm.

The following were among them: Messrs. Thomas Vallier, Samuel Coombs, Fred Banned and James Gibson, Mrs. McClary, wife of Mr. John McClary, was also present along with other members of the McClary family.

A Presentation.
About 9 o'clock came the crowning event of the evening, when Mr. McClary was presented with a handsome token of the high esteem in which he is held by the employees of his firm. A gold-headed ebony cane, with the words, "Diamond Jubilee. To John McClary, Esq., from his employees, July 2nd, 1907," engraved on it.

A handsome leather-bound volume, containing the signatures of all the employees of the McClary Company throughout the Dominion, including the agents, was also presented.

The grand march preceded the presentation. A large number of the employees formed up in double file at either side of the hall and after marching along the outside walls of the room to the far end, returned in fours up the center to where the presentation was made.
