

Solving the Problem of Correct Conservation With Fish.

Sometimes I hear fault-finders complain that when they try to conserve in accordance with the requests of the food administration it means that they must substitute with things that are more expensive. But there is one thing which we can all use to conserve meat which is not beyond the reach of the poorest of us, and that is fish. Even canned fish is not as expensive as meat if you consider the fact that there is absolutely not one ounce of waste in a can of fish. And for those of us who live near enough to a coast to get fresh live formations.

Another simple way of baking fish is to cut the fish into sections large enough for individual servings, dredge with flour, salt and pepper, and then baste with a mixture of melted butter substitute, lemon juice, hot water and a dash of Worcestershire.

The trouble is that we may get into the habit of buying one kind of fish—like herring, let us say, and then frying it always and invariably. But there are so many new varieties of fish being offered that there is no reason why every housekeeper should not at least experiment.

Fish is most delicious when baked—and it is the simplest way of handling it. Clean the fish, wipe dry, place on a rack in a dripping pan. Dredge with a mixture of flour, sait, pepper and cover with bits of butter substitute. Bake for eight or ten minutes to the pound in a moderate oven until tender. Serve with slices of lemon.


NOTICE-MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917

REGISTRATION OF UNITED STATES CITIZENS

Male citizens of the United States living in Canada of AGES 21-30, both inclusive, MUST REGISTER BY RE-GISTERED POST with the Registrar under the Military Service Act of the district in which they live, during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING SEPTEMBER 28th, 1918; and such CITIZENS OF THE AGES 19, 20 AND 31-44, both inclusive, must so register during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING OCTOBER 12th, 1918. It must be emphasized that THIS INCLUDES AMERICANS LIVING IN CANADA OF THE ABOVE AGES, MARRIED AND SINGLE, and includes ALSO ALL THOSE WHO HAVE SECURED DIPLO-MATIC EXEMPTION OR HAVE REGISTERED WITH AN AMERICAN CONSUL, or HAVE REGISTERED FOR MILITARY SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES.

Registration letters may be handed to local Postmasters for despatch to the proper Registrar, under the Military Service Act.

NOTICE-MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917 MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS

Having in view the importance of leaving a sufficient number of men on those farms, which are actually contributing to the National Food Supply, notice is hereby given as follows:

1. ALL MEMBERS OF CLASS I POSSESSING EXEMPTION AS FARMERS which is expiring and WHO WISH TO REMAIN EXEMPT should communicate with the Registrars under the M.S.A., of their respective districts, REQUESTING AN EXTENSION IN TIME OF SUCH EXEMPTION. Questionnaires will thereupon be issued to these men by the Registrar and they will receive further exemption upon furnishing satisfactory proof that they are contributing sufficiently to the National Food Supply.

2. In order to facilitate productive employment during the Winter months, MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS SHOULD APPLY TO THE REGISTRARS FOR PERMITS TO ENGAGE FOR THE WINTER IN SOME OCCUPA-TION OF NATIONAL INTEREST, SUCH AS LUMBER-ING, MUNITION WORK, ETC. Such permits will serve to enable exempted farmers to pursue other useful occupations for the months during which farming operations cannot be
