ATTENDANCE TRIPLED AT ELGIN WINTER FAIR ON THURSDAY

Rain Fails To Stop Throngs at West Lorne.

BANQUET IN TOWN HALL

"Keep More Stock," Is Advice of Minister of Agriculture in Address.

WEST LORNE, Nov. 23.—Those who attended the Elgin Winter Fair today were more than repaid for their trip through driving rains. The program, though slightly altered, was of a high order, and the attendance three times that of yesterday. The fair, which started Tuesday, will finish up tomorrow.

Hon. George S. Henry, provincial minister of agriculture, was the principal speaker at tonight's meeting in the lecture room of the old wagon works. Mr. Henry made his initial appearance before an Elgin audience, and created more or less of a good impression. He touched on agriculture in its various branches, rural credits, the war and its relation to the farmers, provincial highways and the Victory Loan. Mr. Henry complimented the officers of the fair on the exhibits. "I am more than surprised that you have such a fine showing of corn after the crop failures in 1917," said Mr. Henry. "I came from a district (York) where seed corn is not grown. We have come to look for our corn from this direction. I feel that these southern counties have a great field in this line. We didn't get the results this year from Kansas seed corn. You have the market in the northern counties

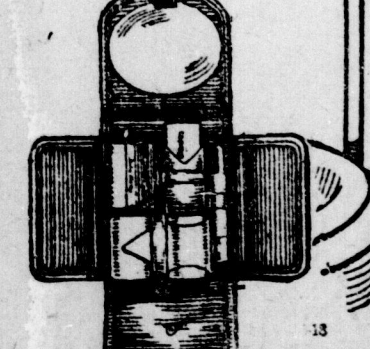

Appreciate Results.

"The results of the last four years we have come now to the period of reconstruction and we will not fail here any more than our boys did overseas. Agriculture has been a big thing the last four years, but we can get more off our land than we got this year. Sometimes I think we have too much land, but we can get results if we grapple them. There is nothing in the world as necessary as an ample supply of food. There will be keen competition in the world's markets later on and we want to take them by the forelock and specialize on quality in our foodstuffs."

Mr. Henry exhorted the farmers to keep up production. There would be no chance of prices dropping and the Allies must be fed and the enemy as well. Foodstuffs will command a high figure for some time. The speaker thought that many of the numerous workers would go back to the farm, many men were anxious to go back on the land.

Keep More Stock. "Keep more stock," urged Mr. Henry, "grain crops are merely a means to an end. Livestock is our future and the sooner we realize it the better."

Peter Stalker, vice-president of the fair, expressed his pleasure at the interest the people took in the fair. He has watched with pride the growth of the association for the past ten years. A practical man, Premier Hearst had no business being minister of agriculture, declared Mr. Stalker amid applause.

What does he know about farming? Lawyers, or no one else, has any right to have a license to tell us how to farm."

W. A. Baker, ex-reeve of West Lorne, presided at the meeting.

Banquet in Town Hall.

In the absence of President Carmichael, J. B. Ferguson, reeve of West Lorne, presided at the banquet in the town hall, tendered by the association to the directors and judges, at 6 o'clock this evening. The Women's Institute was heartily congratulated on the bountiful feast spread. R. A. Penhill of St. Thomas was the first speaker. He declared that agriculturists did not have enough voice in matters of import. City people believed they had a divine right over the rural population, as witness the price-fixing on farm products that had been distributed. The city people could charge what they liked for their products, and never a word said.

Best Fair Yet.

Wm. Todd, reeve of Yarmouth, had attended the fair for many years, but this was the best yet, both in quality and quantity. The show should be broadened out and be strong for a field crop competition, with some hundreds of dollars for prizes.

Hon. George S. Henry gave a short address, in which he advocated a system of rural credits. He spoke of a banker friend, Mr. Elliott of Belleville, who presided at a banquet of 400 farmers last week. Mr. Elliott assisted these men in all their undertakings, financial and otherwise. The Government was useful, giving careful consideration to all rural problems.

Surprised at Size.

J. W. Clarke of Cainsville declared he was greatly surprised at the size of the poultry show. He asked that the Government do something to make poultrymen refrain from advertising "best to lay" chickens. The O. A. C. had a stranglehold on this class of bird and poultrymen were feeding the public by advertising stock they did not possess.

Thos. W. Sims, secretary of the show, stated that fully 50 per cent of the exhibitors were mere boys. This was a good thing. The fair never had better pork had their hogs had been there and fair. Talk On Sheep.

In the afternoon John Gardhouse of Weston gave an interesting talk on sheep. He advised the farmers to take care of the wool, as the buyers now that the war was over would be more particular and would frown on any dirt in the wool.
