

NEEDED REVOLVERS TO BEAT THEIR WAY ON FREIGHT TRAINS

Windsor Youths Will Be Sent
Back Home.

CHIEF EXPRESSES VIEWS

Says Yellow Novels and the
Movies Induce Boys To
Carry Guns.

Attempting to emulate the heroes of the "real life" novels, the highly-colored "real life" novels were the said heroes invariably furnished automatic revolvers in the reason why so many youngsters are carrying weapons, according to Chief of Police Williams.

Carrying concealed revolvers or other weapons without a police permit is a serious breach of the law, and most of the offenders in this respect are young men in their teens, with a bent of lawlessness and a misconception of citizenship fostered by the reading of the movie and novel hold-up "heroes" as they are called.

"We needed revolvers while we were heading our way on freight trains," was the explanation given to the police by Bert Patermalz and Freeman Bondie, both of Windsor, when they were arrested recently for carrying weapons, with cartridges. They rode to this city from Windsor on freight trains, they told the police.

The two were remanded for a week when they appeared this morning in police court, and they will be sent back to Windsor to be dealt with by the police there. Both were charged with suspended sentence from the Windsor courts on theft charges. Bondie, according to information given to the police, is on suspended sentence for stealing a bicycle and for breaking traffic laws, while Patermalz has been let go on charges of stealing harness and an overcoat at Windsor.

The revolvers have been confiscated and added to the chief's collection of weapons and crime relics.

Police Think They Are Now on Trail of Importer of Liquor

Suspect White Man, Who Is
Said To Be Boasting.

Clues which may lead to the arrest of the white man who is said to have ordered the importation of the 350 bottles of whiskey, taken in a raid on a dining car on the Grand Trunk tracks at Burwell street Sunday night, July 20, by police, has been secured by local detectives.

Jules Kennedy, the colored man who was arrested by Patrolman Reilly shortly before the raid, was charged with having possession of the whiskey haul in police court, for which he was sentenced to four months in jail and later escaped, is still free.

A white man, believed by the police to be a bootlegger, is said to have bragged to associates in a saloon bar here recently that he stole clothes from the car in which the whiskey was taken before it was taken in the police raid. He is also believed to be the man who employed Kennedy to bring the whiskey to this city from Montreal. Kennedy in police court refused to divulge the names of those to whom the liquor was consigned, but the police believe that the white man suspected may be able to furnish information which will lead to the capture of the colored jail breaker.

The whiskey, amounting to 350 bottles, was valued at \$2,500 by the police and was the largest haul made in this city since the Ontario temperance act became effective.

PERMITS FOR \$200,000 WORTH OF BUILDING TAKEN OUT; MORE YET TO COME

Month Likely to Exceed Half-Million
Considerably.

Permits representing \$200,000 worth of building have been booked by Building Inspector A. M. Piper this morning. The Holcroft-Holcroft Company has taken out a permit for a four-story factory on Bathurst street, to cost \$150,000. George Davis has received a permit to construct a 1½-story house on Dorchester street at a cost of \$2,000.

More than a half-million dollars worth of building has yet to be booked. In this included is a factory to be built on 110,000; Loew's Theatre, \$250,000, and Allen's Theatre, about \$150,000.

Work on the Allen Theatre will commence immediately, and that on the Loew building is already well advanced.

ing For Wager.

Allison of Detroit, Mich., who was with the 67th Aerial Squadron, Aviation Section, about 18 months overseas, four of them in France, and was once wounded; A. Rosenbloom, U. S. S. von Steubenberg, who gave nine months' service.

The boys left for Hamilton about 1 o'clock.

KRESELLA FREED ON CHARGES OF HAVING FORGED BANK NOTES

Will Appear As a Witness
Against Joe Manenti.

Police will secure Lebert Kressella, 472 Talbot street, the 18-year-old Italian boy, as a material witness to testify at the trial of Joe Manenti at the September assizes, charged with having forged bank notes. Kressella may give bond at the police court tomorrow for the boy's appearance at Manenti's trial. Kressella this morning was freed on the three charges of having forged bank notes in his possession on which he was held in jail from the time he was arrested several days after he met Manenti here.

Manenti was arrested in Hamilton a month later and brought here for a hearing at which Kressella gave evidence. He was found guilty of forgery, and in the meantime he is a prisoner in the county jail.

Acute influenza pneumonia figures among the communicable diseases reported to the medical officer of health in the week ending August 2, there being one case reported from Little Italy. Typhoid fever had two victims in bed, but not isolated, while influenza, diphtheria and tuberculosis each claimed one. Three cases of venereal diseases were reported.

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WITNESS SAYS STRIKE LEADER PLANNED FIGHT

Declares R. A. Bray Boasted
He Had Organized Band
Ready at Signal.

ALDERMAN IN THE PLOT

R. N. W. Policeman Gives
Evidence at Winnipeg Con-
spiracy Trial.

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 5.—R. A. Bray, returned soldier and Winnipeg strike leader, on trial for conspiracy, declared on June 10 last that he had a fully organized band of 5,000 men, ready to take up arms at a given signal. A. A. Heaps, labor alderman of the city of Winnipeg, who is on trial with Bray and six other labor leaders, knew of the plan.

This was the sworn evidence of Detective W. H. McLaughlin of the North-West Mounted Police, in court here today. McLaughlin testified in part as follows:

"In the course of my conversation with Bray he stated that this affair was going to end in a fight, and when I lamented the fact that we had no guns, Bray said, 'Don't worry about guns. We'll have them. We have got between 3,000 and 4,000 men ready and instructed to be in certain places when the alarm is sounded and they will get the guns. They will take them from the real soldiers and seize the barracks.'

McLaughlin was a plain clothes man assigned to follow the strike and he was in the confidence of several of the labor leaders.

In the same conversation McLaughlin testified, Bray said that the strike agents of what was going on in the ranks of the opposition. Bray had heard that a raid was to be made on aliens in the north end of Winnipeg and said that he got a car and a girl who could speak their lingo to warn the aliens. Bray was quoted as saying that 'the way the bouncers ran to their homes to get something to fight with was plain evidence that the police would get what they were coming to them.'

McLaughlin's reports covered various meetings of the strikers and their committee and dealt exhaustively with revolutionary utterances made by various leaders as the strike progressed.

Tack-Makers Vote To Go On Strike For More Wages

BORCKTON, Mass., Aug. 5.—Members of the recently organized Tack Makers' Union voted tonight to go on strike tomorrow in an effort to en-
force wage demands of \$9 a day for men operating more than fifteen machines and 40 cents a machine for men operating fewer than fifteen machines. The men claim that the United Shoe Machinery Corporation, which controls most of the factories, has refused to submit their demands for arbitration.

FARMERS AND LABOR MEN LIKELY TO JOIN FORCES IN N. PERTH

Conference Held at Stratford
To Discuss Joint
Candidate.

STRATFORD, Aug. 5.—As a result of a conference here tonight between representatives of the United Farmers' Club of North Perth and the trades and labor council, it is probable that a joint farmer-labor convention will be held in the near future to choose a joint candidate for the coming election.

OWNER OF CAR IS FREED; CHAUFFEUR ARRESTED AT GALT

Reckless Driving Charge Now
Against Driver of
Auto.

GALT, Aug. 5.—Paul Freeman, a local Russian, was this afternoon dismissed by Magistrate Blake on a charge of reckless driving. The case was the outcome of an auto collision on the Preston road early in July, in which Freeman's car struck a taxi, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Consaul and child of Toronto, and Joseph Kayan being injured. The defence claimed Tony Charnaby was driving the car and not Freeman. Charnaby was arrested on the same charge and was released on \$1,000 bail furnished by Freeman.

WORKERS ON THE CANAL TO GET HYDRO SCHEDULE

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways and canals, had a meeting with Welland Canal contractors today. The contractors informed the minister that the demands of the men were for the same hourly schedule rate as paid by the hydro-electric commission for similar work in that district. It was decided to prolong the work by working only the shortest number of hours each day that will be satisfactory to the men, and to pay them the hydro-electric hourly schedule.

WOULD CONTROL FOOD PRICES IN GREAT BRITAIN

Food Controller Says Further
Advances Are Inevitable
Otherwise.

INTERNATIONAL ACTION Favors Prison Sentences in Cases of Flagrant Profiteering.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—George H. Roberts, the food controller, learned today at the first sitting of the House of Commons as a select committee to inquire into the high cost of living and profiteering. He said his department had had difficulty in defining cases of alleged profiteering. He added that where persons were clearly found guilty of profiteering they should be punished more severely than at present is the case.

Mr. Roberts said he had reached the following conclusions:

First, that there should be an effective control of food prices always, and of supplies and their distribution at all stages.

Second, that the same method could be applied to other articles, such as household utensils, if they could be standardized. Whether it should be applied to a wide range of goods was not decided.

Third, that the costing department (which fixes prices) could do for other articles what it does for food.

Fourth, that a single department should be responsible for publishing facts regarding the cost of living here and in other countries.

Fifth, that with a reduction in working hours to follow, an increase in output a further increase in prices seemed inevitable without control.

Controlled Prices.

Mr. Roberts said that 94 per cent of the food in England was subject to government control. In an effort to balance the budget, he added, was more costly, but a part was lower in price since control had been effected.

The food minister said that unfortunately much of England's food had come from America, because other sources had been shut off, and that in the American exchange rate had worked hard.

Mr. Roberts said the ministry was unable to do anything regarding an alleged American meat combine. He suggested that this situation called for international action on the board of trade. Mr. Roberts added, was inquiring into what might be done to protect the country against high meat prices.

In cases of flagrant profiteering, Mr. Roberts said he favored sentences of imprisonment and the permanent withdrawal of the license of guilty persons.

LACK OF BUSINESS CAUSES TIE-UP OF LAKE FREIGHTERS

Large Steamer, J. H. C.
Hagarty, Pays Crew
Off at Sarnia.

SARNIA, Aug. 5.—The large steamer J. H. C. Hagarty, in command of Capt. Ed. Robinson of Goderich, is lying at the dock below the offices of the Northern Navigation Company and the crew have been paid off and are unable to secure cargoes is given as the reason for the tie-up. The ship has been handling iron ore between the north shore and Point Edward this summer and had the iron ore for the last time.

Other well-known steamers are said to be in the same position and are idle for the same reason. The Grant Morden, the largest freighter on the lakes, the E. B. Osler, Midland Prince and other boats are reported to have some out of commission until business picks up.

INQUEST ADJOURNED IN BAKER DROWNING CASE AT STRATFORD

Quite a Stir Caused in Labor
Circles Over Machinists'
Union Action.

STRATFORD, Aug. 5.—The inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death of the late Roy Baker, who was drowned in the Avon on Monday afternoon, opened before Coroner Monteith this morning. After the body and the scene of the drowning had been viewed an adjournment was made until Friday morning, when Coroner Monteith announced that the reason for holding the investigation was, not that anyone was suspected of having directly or indirectly caused his death, but to determine if there has been any negligence on the part of any civic body of those responsible for providing equipment for life-saving for any who might get into difficulty while in swimming.

Quite a stir has been caused in local labor circles by the action of the machinists' union in recalling its entire slate of delegates to the trades and labor council and electing new members. Only two of the former members were returned.

This in itself is not so remarkable, except for the fact that among those who failed to be returned were President J. S. Moore, Vice-President R. Hurst and Treasurer A. Skidmore of the trades and labor council. Ordinarily they would have been returned.

Local laborers are planning a big celebration on Labor Day, and the program is now working on. It is the intention to secure an outside speaker and to hold a general day of demonstration.

There is keen interest being manifested in the proposed new monument to the soldiers' monument. Any other suggestion advanced today was placed on the back burner.
