**BIG GLENCOE FAIR
MECCA OF CROWDS
FROM FAR AROUND**School Exhibit in Conjunction
With Popular Ekfrid and
Mosa Show.

GLENCOE, Sept. 29.—Held in conjunction with the district rural school fair for the first time, the Mosa and Ekfrid Agricultural Association's annual show held here on Tuesday and Wednesday will go down in records as probably the most successful from the standpoint of attendance and many lines of exhibits in the history of the association. Four thousand people crowded into the grounds showed the popularity of the combined exhibition.

Fast horse racing, the great tent where the school children's exhibits were placed, the crystal ball, besides the superb livestock exhibits proved irresistible attractions, while the midway, where dozens of amusement booths distributed ketchup dolls and plaster dogs in generous numbers, held the interest of everyone. The great spirit of good-fellowship and the many meetings between old friends gave the whole an aspect of an old-boy reunion.

The exhibits, which really were only a mere detail of the fair, were better and more numerous in some classes than in the past years, while in others they were not so good. The cattle beyond a doubt made the best showing of all the departments.

Home of Fine Stock.
The country in the vicinity of Glen-coe has a name for itself as a home for high-grade pure-bred beef cattle. The entries were large, and the quality the best in this class of animal. The dairy class, however, had few entries. Many excellent Herefords, Durhams and Aberdeen Angus were placed in the ring. While it is impossible to publish the names of the individual winners in any class, owing to a list not being compiled, the exhibitors winning the greatest number of prizes were: Henderson, D. R. McInnes in Durhams; A. E. Perry in Herefords; and J. L. Tait in Aberdeen Angus.

The horse exhibit was not so large or the animals so fine as in the past years. Some excellent light drivers were shown along with some fancy drivers, but the future of the industry was the agricultural class. A few good heavy drafts were on exhibition. There were a number of colts of every description. In the agricultural class G. Duncan was the heaviest winner, while John McCann and G. McCaughan excelled in the heavy breeds. The carriage class was swept by D. M. Munro, H. Harold and D. McEwen.

The sheep and hog exhibits were disappointing to the directors. They were small but of good quality. There was poor accommodation for either of these classes, and several complaints were heard from exhibitors. The pens on the grounds were in so poor a condition that many animals were crowded together all day. Alfred Gould swept the boards with some fine hogs. The poultry exhibit was about the same in size as usual.

Bountiful harvest must have been the cause of the abundance of produce in the splendid exhibit of fruits, vegetables and grains could be taken as any criterion. The exhibits were not quite as numerous in other years, but they excelled in quality. William Gould, Joe Gould and Alex. Letch were the heaviest winners. In the dairy department Mrs. D. A. Campbell and Mrs. A. M. Letch made the best showing.

The centre of interest for the women was the exhibit of ladies' work which practically filled the whole of the upstairs in the main building. Although small, it cannot be expected to be an efficient judge of such fine work of art, the display of all sorts of dainty needlework was probably the most beautiful as well as varied. Races Well Contested.
The horse racing was well contested and good times were made in every class of the two races. Considerable excitement was caused by an impromptu running race with three horses taking part, just to prove which was the best horse. The name of the winner was "Centaur".

While the school exhibition was held in the same grounds and in a tent, the most shining feature of the fair was the children's exhibit. The children were treated as a separate affair. Not a few of the officials, as well as the visitors to the grounds, ascertained that the entries and exhibits made by the children far exceeded those made by members of the fair association. It was undoubtedly the most successful school fair ever held by the ten schools included in this district, and as this was the first time it was held in Glen-coe, it promises to be even a greater success next year.

Every class of exhibits were largely entered and the vegetables, fruits and flowers grown from seed by the children of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and raised entirely by the children themselves, were of the very highest quality.

The great tent was richly filled with a colorful display of flowers and fruit. In one end, consisting of rabbits, dogs, ferrets and kittens, proved a great attraction for the children. Cooking done by the little girls made a delightful display. In the manual training class, indicated that that branch of teaching was finding fertile ground in the country youth.

School Pupil's Parade.
A parade of the pupils from the schools was held in the early afternoon. As they marched before the grandstand the schools' bands playing the best showing were picked as prize winners. S. S.
