CONTRACT GOES TO PEOPLE

Vote on Jan. 7—So Does the Hydro-Power Plebiscite.

HAMILTON, May 10.—(Special.)—The city council this evening decided to send the Cataract power contract and the plebiscite on hydro-electric power to the people on January 7. The mayor and a majority of those who spoke on the subject, said that the Cataract by-law was a great improvement on the one rushed thru the council last July. It provides that the company must give Hamilton and its inhabitants power at 10 or 10 p.c. lower rates than charged by the Hydro-Electric Commission in any place, and also at as low rates as any place that sells power. The people will be asked in January their opinion as to the introduction of a board of control, and the purchase of a \$30,000 site for a new hospital. A by-law was passed keeping dogs off the streets, except when held on a leash, from March to November.

Canadian Delegation May Play Big Part in Important Matter.
BOSTON, Mass., May 10.—(Special.)—About 450 delegates to the 22nd grand division of the Order of Railway Conductors of America were registered at headquarters to-night.

In this number is a solid delegation from the Canadian provinces, headed by S. N. Berry of Toronto, vice-president for Canada, and D. McHaffie, Stratford; K. Hastings, Toronto; B. W. Bennett, London; C. Stuart, Toronto; Thos. Todd, Hamilton; A. E. Wright, Ottawa; F. Clement, Saratoga; M. Munroe, Smith's Falls; H. A. Washburn, North Bay; W. V. Hudson, Fort William; A. Sweeney, Chapleau; Ed. Harden, Lindsay; Thos. Steward, York; J. J. Walker, West Toronto; W. C. Risteen, Kerora; F. Heard, Allandale, and some twenty others from Ontario.
Several Canadian clubs in Boston will entertain these Canadian delegates. This group is receiving much attention from the Indianapolis and Grand Rapids "loomers." The former crowd is endeavoring to secure the removal of the home office of the association from Grand Rapids, Ia., and the latter committee of business interests is endeavoring to retain it here. The votes of the Canadian delegates are considered as of great importance in deciding the matter.

As a result of the applications of the Montreal Board of Trade, every railway company subject to the legislative authority of the parliament of Canada is ordered to keep clean and well ventilated all waiting rooms, closets, and to disinfect them. Employees are to give monthly reports on condition of such passenger cars as to be cleaned and ventilated in the same way.

At the Grand.

It is a weird mental phenomenon, as terrible and as sure in the vengeance as the hangman's noose or the headman's knife. Never for an instant does Mr. Shea slip out from the character, nor does he for an instant lose the attention of his audience.
In the tribunal scene, Mathias, under the spell of the hypnotist, is put to sleep and describes every detail of the assassination. During all this Mathias is alone visible on the stage. Court witnesses and jury are unrolled in the darkness. It is a remarkable scene in every respect.
Mr. Shea has practically the same support he had last year. Misses Burkett and Ford being particularly attractive as the wife and daughter of Mathias; Mr. Charters having the splendid role of Father Willis and Jas. J. Cassidy being the spirited young captain, and Henry Sherwood the Polish Jew. The other parts were well taken.
