Some Think the Honor Should Be Sufficient Compensation, Whil Others Would Favor Allowing a Salary of \$3000.

There has been a good deal of public interest aroused in the recommendation of the legislation comimttee of the city council on Friday, that the yearly salary of controllers should be fixed at \$2500. The average man is rather shocked at this sudden jump of \$1800, and is inclined to be suspicious when he remembers that it rests with the alder men to sanction or veto the proposal. and that it is only aldermen with two years, or more experience who are qualified (by law) for appointment to the board of control. The aldermen themselves are divided on the question. sufficient recompense and others estimate the value of a controller up to \$3000. Ald. Ward thinks troller up to \$3000. Ald. Ward thinks it would ald in getting government by commission. With a mayor at \$5000, four controllers at \$2500 apiece and its aldermen at \$300 each, an annual cost to the city for government of \$20,400 might very well be devoted to securing the services of experts.

Ald. Foster says the controllers meet oftener than is necessary. One meeting a week is the schedule, but extra conferences are the rule.

The report of the legislative committee, recommending that the salary of controllers be increased from \$1000 to \$2500, did not come before council yesterday, contrary to expectation. It will come up, however, on Monday next.

AldWard was not pleased at the prominence given him as the mover of the motion in committee recommending the increase. He favored an increase to \$2000, but Ald Coatsworth and Jones wanted to make it \$3000. The mayor suggested \$2500, and it was allowed to go on to council at that figure.

Mayor Urquhart does not consider that the controllers are in any way sufficiently paid for the time they are compelled to give to civic business. The board is becoming more and more the main executive body, and the council is attending to legislation. The meetings average more than two per week The report of the legislative
